INSURANCE CO. ASKS COURT TO DETERMINE OWNERSHIP OF \$500

To determine the rightful owner of \$500 insurance, the Prudential Insurance Co. has brought suit against De-la-Tighe, Thomas F. Tighe and Joseph Cullen of this city. In the papers filed today in the common pleas court it is set forth that Thomas Cullen, who took out the policy, died June 3, 1913.

Joseph Cullen claimed to be the beneficiary, and wanted the \$500, but so did De-la-Tighe. The company is ignorant of the rights of the parties and wants the court to enjoin them from taking further proceedings until the court has determined to whom the money belongs. The insurance company also asks to be freed from any further liability after the court's decision is given.

MAN SHE AIDED SAVES MOTHER AND CHILD

New York, Dec. 31.—Mrs. John Fitzpatrick and her five-year-old son, Eugene, were saved from death yesterday in a fire which swept the three-story tenement house at 449 Twentieth street, Brooklyn, by a man whom she found several days ago helpless in the street suffering from a sprained ankle and whom she aided home.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick and the child were on the third floor alone. Her husband having gone to see his mother, who is reported to be dying. The fire started on the first floor and in a moment had swept through the entire house. Frank Parker, a street car conductor, and the man whom Mrs. Fitzpatrick had aided happened along in time to see the panic-stricken woman about to hurl her child from the window. He quickly mounted the fire escape and saved both.

The building was entirely destroyed with a damage of \$5,000.

RESERVE BANK BOARD WILL HOLD MEETINGS IN MOST BIG TOWNS

Washington, Dec. 31.—When the reserve bank organization committee begins its tour of the country next week, it will hold hearings morning and afternoon, six days a week, make 500 mile railroad jumps over night and in the odd moments aboard trains will hold down testimony taken at hearings.

The committee has less than two months to complete its work in which it will visit many cities and spend a week or more in Washington giving evidence.
