DUNDEE MUST IMPROVE TO BEAT CHAMP JOHNNY KILBANE

Jim Corbett Says Willie Ritchie Is Superior To Ad Wolgast At The Present Time

New York, March 7.—March is popularly supposed to be a stormy month. And in this part of the country it certainly started off as if it intended living up to its reputation, but the weather is in fact, it looks as if it might develop into the busiest, fighting month we have known in a long time.

Nearly every one of the star boxers in the smaller divisions will shake a leg within the roped arena once or more during March. Beginning Wednesday night, when "Phil" Champion and Johnny Kilbane will defend his honors in a six round bout with Johnny Dundee, considered his most dangerous rival.

Thursday night, in Newark, N. J., Dundee will meet the champion of the world, Ad Wolgast, who is supposed to be the best of the bunch. His opponent was Pal Moore, who was rated a head-liner two years ago.

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On Thursday, March 13, the day after Ritchie and Wolgast have it out Leach Cross and Young Joe Shugrue, two of the very best boys in the "ambitious" division, are to meet in a ten round session at a local club.

Then there is the bout scheduled at Tom McCarey's club some time during the month between Freddy Welsh and Joe Rivers. I don't know the exact date. I have seen it announced for March 12, also for March 17. Any Rivers may spoil Manager Harry Pollock's dream about Freddy beating Ritchie for the world's title.

It looks to me, if Freddy is on the down grade, Pollock, as a good business man, would devote his efforts solely to the big cleanup that a battle with Ritchie for the world's title would surely bring him. A defeat by Rivers would relegate Welsh to the second division and mean that the days for important matches and big purses are over.

Everything considered March looks like a big month in pugilism. Danny McKittrick writes from Paris that June 27 has been set as the date for the Johnson-Moran bout for the championship of the world.
