WESTINGHOUSE, INVENTOR AND HELPER OF HUMANITY, DEAD

Airbrake, Product Of His Brain Has Saved More Lives Than Were Lost Through Napoleon's Wars—His Role As Builder Of Nation

New York, March 13.—George Westinghouse, engineer and inventor of the airbrake that "has saved more lives than Napoleon lost in all his battles," died of heart-disease yesterday in his apartment in the Langham, in Central Park West, near Seventy-third street.

More than 6 feet in height and possessing tremendous physical energy, he proved a man of indomitable power, but he always was thoughtful to others. He introduced in this country the Saturday half-holiday, now almost general.

His death has been expected for some days. He had been ill for eight months, but his normal alertness remained unimpaired to the end.

Mr. Westinghouse married in August, 1887, Marguerite Eshkine Walker. They had one child, George Westinghouse, Jr., who lives near Lenox, Mass. The latter married Miss Violet Brocklebank, daughter of Sir Thomas and Lady Brocklebank of Irton Hall, Cumberland, England.

Mr. Westinghouse made many advances in the science of railway signaling. He fathered in this country the development of the alternating current system for electric lighting and electric power.

The underlying factors of the problem are those of transportation and distribution. In the typical family among the masses the outlay for food is 45 to 50 per cent of the budget.
