IN FINANCIAL CIRCLES

(The Barron Financial News Service.) New York, March 13.—The Lorillard Tobacco Co. occupies the unique position of being the only one of the three larger manufacturing companies—American Tobacco, Liggett & Myers and Lorillard—to show earnings better than those of the preceding year.

As predicted in these columns the annual report of the American Sugar Refining Co. for the year ended December 31 showed a deficit after operations, which was due to the depressed state of the sugar market for the greater part of the period. Profits from operations amounted to \$1,015,853, compared with \$4,432,200 in 1911.

Central Leather's plan to buy in between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000 of its first lien 5 per cent bonds annually with money derived from the stumpage tax on timber cut has been reflected in a 4 1/2 point advance in the bonds since the plan was announced late in December.

United Gold Mines has declared a dividend of \$4 a share. Three months ago and a year ago \$7.50 was paid. The Old Dominion Co. of Maine owns all the United Globe stock. The Old Dominion Co. of Maine in turn reduced its dividend to \$1 quarterly, against \$1.25 previously paid.

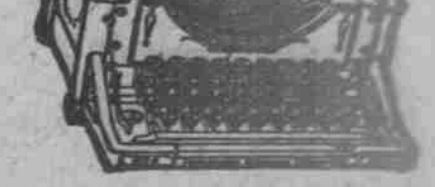
