1886—The Amateur Athletic club, designed to foster and revive the interest in boxing and to provide new rules and sharply differentiate between amateur and professionalistic contests, was launched in London. John G. Chambers, a famous athletic expert and writer on sports, was the father of the club, but in order to give weight to the scheme by securing the patronage of a member of the nobility he interested the Marquis of Queensberry in the proposition.

CITY OF ESMERALDA IS TAKEN WITHOUT FIGHT

Panama, March 13—Details of the recapture of Esmeraldas, Ecuador, by General Leonidas Plaza, President of Ecuador, show that the rebels quietly stole away from the town without fighting. Colonel Carlos Concha, who, with his rebel followers, had been in possession of Esmeraldas since December, realized that further resistance was hopeless as the government forces were much superior. He therefore ordered the evacuation of the town and General Plaza took immediate possession without firing a shot.
