Washington, May 14.—Representative Jeremiah Donovan was very persistent at the session today when he raised a point of order against Rep. Greene of Massachusetts. Today Mr. Greene gained the floor when the bill for the codification of the laws was before the House and began to talk about a private pension bill. Congressman Donovan asked the Massachusetts member to desist from raising up the time of the House for his private bill, and said that it was the first time that he had ever known the gentleman from Massachusetts to transgress thusly.
