FAIRFIELD TRIBE OF RED MEN IS FORMALLY OPENED

Unquowa tribe, L. O. R. M., of Fairfield, came into being last night at Pickett's hall, the formal institution being under the direction of Great Sachem George A. Fairchild of Stratford, assisted by Grand Keeper of Records William Saunders of Naugatuck, Deputy Great Sachem Louis E. Peck of Stratford and George M. Barnes of Bridgeport, and Past Sachem E. E. Treadwell and Thomas Cole of Bridgeport.

These tribal chiefs were elected: Sachem, E. L. Tarlton; senior sagamore, J. J. Killian; junior sagamore, William W. Amidon; prophet, Charles H. King; keeper of records, Edward M. Doyle; keeper of wampum, Raymond Randall; collector of wampum, Mads Mickelson; trustee for one year, Isaac N. Bock; trustee for two years, Deputy Sheriff H. R. Elwood; trustee for three years, E. J. Flanagan.
