

HOW TO SAVE LIVES Of Persons Accidentally Shocked by Electricity

How to save the life of a person who has been accidentally shocked by electricity is the subject of a chart and a pocket pamphlet just issued by the National Electric Light Association to its member companies.

President Gilchrist of the Association took the initiative in requesting that the American Medical Association and the American Institute of Electrical Engineers cooperate with his own organization to form a commission on Resuscitation from Electric Shock.

Three problems were considered by the Commission. The first was what is the layman to do when he comes across a person who has been shocked and who, apparently, is dead.

The second consideration had to do with special mechanical devices for continuing artificial respiration, and the possible invention of a simple effective apparatus which could be quickly and easily learned.

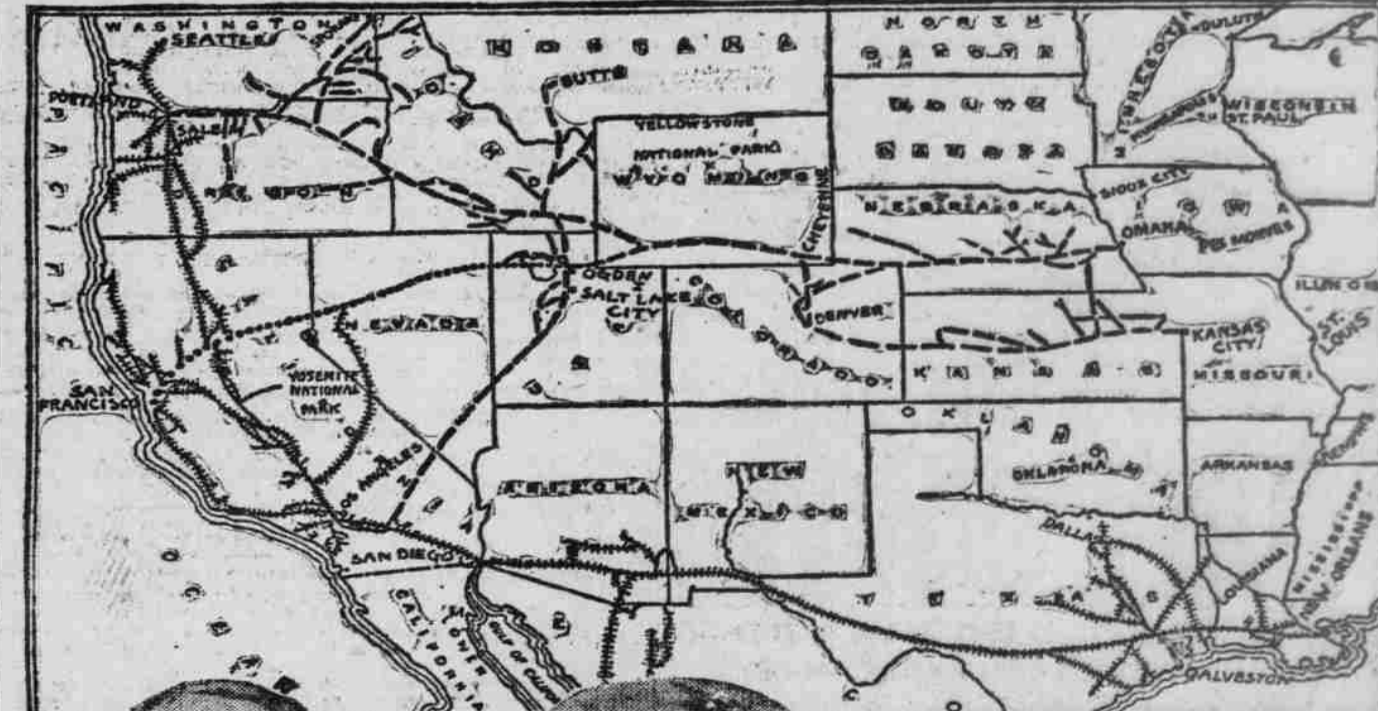
THE LAND OF USED TO BE
