Something New in the Way of Shampoo

To the woman who wishes to have beautiful hair I say, "keep it clean."

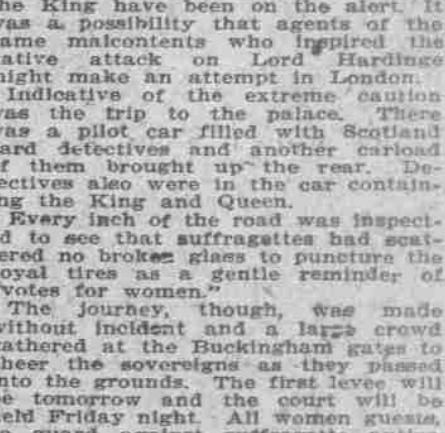
