## AUSTRALIAN PROMOTER THINKS BASEBALL TOUR WILL BE SUCCESS

(By T. S. Andrews.) Will the tour of the Chicago White Sox and New York Giants help our national game in Australia? The above question was put to J. D. Williams, the Australian moving picture king, who was here last week with Hugh D. McIntosh, former promoter of boxing.

"The tour will be a success without a doubt," said Mr. Williams, "as the men back of it are going in with money alone. From a financial standpoint I do not think it will be a success, as the expenses of such a trip are very great and the people of the Australian continent are not familiar enough with the game to patronize it on a scale that might be expected here, although there will be thousands of them going out of curiosity. I know whereof I speak for I have played myself, having been born and reared in the States, and have had experience in it besides.

"The Australians are the greatest sport-loving people on the earth and they will spend their money freely to see all the best in that line, but they will not be balked. You must show them the real goods and they will not hesitate to pay the price. I had in mind a similar scheme three years ago, and even went so far as to arrange for two teams going over, but other things developed which prevented the project going through. I know all about Charles Comiskey and John McGraw, and feel sure they will create plenty of interest in the game of baseball by their tour. It needs something of that kind to start the natives. You know there are lots of baseball teams in Sydney and Melbourne now and a league is in existence there, but, of course, the players are not up to the standard of your leagues here. However, they are learning, and in time the game may rank with football, which is very popular over in that country. Cricket seems to be losing ground, and I would not be surprised to see the great English game give way to baseball during the next quarter century.

"The tour of the American nine will be most successful in Japan, where the Japs like it and will attend to learn the sport, as they read it. In Australia they will be lucky to break even, and the same for the Philippines and through India and Italy, but in France they will draw big, for the French people are anxious to take it up. England may take to it more kindly than we imagine. On the whole, the trip will be a money loser, to my way of thinking, but it will be of good other ways, and in that respect will be a great triumph for Comiskey and McGraw."

Mr. Williams has decided to introduce some of his moving picture novelties in this country and will make New York his home for a time, but expects to return to Australia within a year or two.

## SPORTOGRAPHY

In the number of foreign horses entered, the value of prizes, in levying of decoration, and many other important particulars, the seventh International Horse Show, opening today in London, will be the greatest event of its kind ever held. The United States and Canada will be especially prominent. Canadian officers will ride against other foreign officers for the King George and King Edward cups. The total prize list this year amounts to \$80,000.

While horse fairs have been held in many nations from earliest times, the modern horse show may be said to date from 1864, when the first of the great annual national horse shows was held at the Agricultural Hall, Islington, the United States and Canada, and important shows are now held annually in scores of cities on this side of the Atlantic.

The London International Horse Show was instituted about seven years ago. The purpose of the association was to keep the breeding of horses up to high standard, as it was feared that the growing popularity of the motor car might cause people to lose interest in horses. The Earl of Lonsdale, famous as a patron of racing, boxing, and all other sports, was the leader in the movement, and was ably assisted by Sir Gilbert Greenall and two Americans, Alfred G. Vanderbilt and Judge William H. Moore.
