Brilliant Californian Wins From Pate, Former Cornell Star

William M. Johnston, the young Californian, won his place in the fifth round of the New York State lawn tennis championship tournament yesterday on the courts of the Crescent Club at Croton Ridge. He was the winner, and defeated W. L. Pate, the former Cornell athlete, in straight sets at 6-3, 6-4. No other competitions in the singles were decided, and the committee postponed the beginning of matches of forty-five pairs drawn in the doubles until tomorrow.

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JOE JACKSON LEADING TY COBB IN BATTING

Chicago, Aug. 4.—The pace set by Joe Jackson proved too swift for Ty Cobb and the Detroit player fell behind in the American league batting averages. Jackson pounded his percentage up to .408 but Cobb dropped to .398. Charles McDonald, Boston, continues to be the real leader in the National, with .471, though Earl Fyning, Brooklyn, has .473, and is hitting .393.

Humphreys, Chicago, and Demaree, New York, are tied with nine wins and two defeats. KING GEORGE'S CUTTER GRABS YACHTING CUP

Cowen, Isle of Wight, Aug. 4.—King George, on board his veteran cutter Britannia, at the Cowes regatta, today, won the Satanita Cup, a handicap for cutters, yawls and ketches, presented by Sir Maurice Fitzgerald. The Britannia, which had not raced at Cowes for nearly 15 years, was the scratch boat. The other competitors were the yawl Wendur and the ketches Julnar and Cariad.
