WANT POLICE WOMAN ON NEW HAVEN FORCE FOR DETECTIVE WORK

New Haven, Aug. 6.—The effort made by philanthropic and church societies to have a police woman on the New Haven force will be redoubled in view of the estimates of police expenses made up yesterday by the commissioners, in which there is an item of \$1,900 which would be available for such a purpose. The commissioners are understood to favor trial of a woman officer to be attached to the detective bureau and to be available for cases in which a woman could do service much better than a man. Omaha, Neb., Aug. 6.—The Nebraska progressive committee which met yesterday decided to place in the field at the next election complete state, congressional, legislative and county tickets.

BALTIMORE MUNICIPALITY MAY PASS ORDINANCE FOR SEGREGATION OF THE RACES

Baltimore, Aug. 6.—The Maryland court of appeals in a preliminary opinion handed down shortly before midnight, last night, held "that the mayor and city council of Baltimore may, in the exercise of its police powers, validly pass an ordinance for the segregation of the white and colored races without conflicting with the provisions of the constitution of the United States or of the state of Maryland." The opinion, however, declared invalid on technical grounds an ordinance approved by the mayor in 1912. It was announced that an ordinance will be drawn up to meet the legal situation.

400 MEN AND WOMEN FIGHT FIRE AT CAMP GROUNDS

Chatham, Mass., Aug. 6.—An all night fight by 400 men and women against a forest fire that threatened to destroy the Methodist camp grounds at Yarmouth was successful, early today, when the flames were brought under control at the edge of the grounds. A few of the families living at the camp grounds vacated their homes on the approach of the fire.
