CITY COURT CASES

Emma Kovach, 15 years old, daughter of Gustave Kovach, 20 White street, charged with being incorrigible, was committed to the House of the Good Shepherd, Hartford, her sentence being later suspended upon evidence of the probation officers submitted as to home conditions of six children. A warning was given by Judge Coughlin to the parents that future complaints would result in arrest of the parents. The girl has returned to her work.

John Ohnick, 150 Church street, four times sent to the Shelton Sanitarium, has again been returned to that institution by legal proceedings instituted by the Board of Health co-operating with the Charity Department. Although no law exists which compels confinement in the institution, it has been found that the health department may order tubercular patients endangering the health of the community to stay away from certain places and unless Ohnick obeys the injunctions of the court he can be given a jail sentence.

According to evidence given today by Supt. Fred Johnson, of the Charities Department, Ohnick is suffering from advanced consumption and has already given it to one of three children who died as a result. In disposing of the pitiful case Judge Coughlin regretted the necessity of separating husband from wife and family, but decided public health required such action, assuring the victim that adequate provisions for the care of his family would be made by the city.

William McDonald, 357 Broad street, charged with intoxication and abusive language to Mrs. Mary C. Mills, 365 Broad street, was fined \$15 and costs. An appeal was taken under bonds of \$100.

Nicholas Pouvanello was charged with a breach of the peace. After falling from a car he ran wild in the wards of St. Vincent's hospital last night, greatly exciting the patients. As none from the hospital pressed the charge, the case was nolle.

Walter West, charged with maintaining a house of ill-repute at 1185 Iranistan avenue, was fined \$50 and costs and sentenced to six months in jail. An appeal was granted under bonds of \$500. Charles Barr, a sailor, was fined \$10 with suspended sentence. Beatrice Jones, also accused of frequenting, was fined \$10 and costs, but later placed on probation with the understanding she leave town.

Frank Kosozan, charged with intoxication, breach of the peace, resistance to an officer and carrying concealed weapons, was fined \$25 and costs.

The case of Annie Frances and Peter Maher, accused of theft of \$475 from Theobald Vaughn, 18 Wales block, were again continued until the return of Prosecutor DeLaney, August 20.

FAVOR COMPLETE PENSION SYSTEM

Special Commission Of Episcopal Church, In Report, Presents Comprehensive Plan

TO COST \$500,000 YEARLY

Proposes To Provide For All Clergy Over 65 Years Of Age And For Widows And Orphans

In a preliminary report the commission on pensions of the Episcopal church develops some interesting information. The report shows that the Episcopal church pays \$8,000,000 a year in salaries to its clergy, who number 5,500. The bold plan proposed by the commission is intended not only to pension the whole body of the clergy when they become 65 years old, but also to pension the widows, to educate their orphan children, and to take care of clergymen disabled at any age. It will apply to foreign missionaries as well as to the entire United States. The pension will be approximately half day.

The sums of money involved are large. No less than \$7,000,000 will be necessary to provide for the pension obligations at the start, and no less than \$500,000 will be thereafter expended each year by the pension fund.

This pension plan is the result of a comprehensive study carried on for three years by a commission of distinguished churchmen, of which Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts is chairman, and Bishop Greer of New York is a member. The pension plan was framed by Monell Sayre, an official of the Carnegie Foundation and an authority on pensions, who is one of the six laymen who are members of the commission.

The plan is based upon the study of every pension system in the world, including those of governments, colleges, public school teachers, railroads, banks, etc. Facts have been collected from every Episcopal clergyman, and these facts studied by eminent authorities on statistics. Some of the details of the proposed scheme are innovations in pension systems. On one fundamental principle, the method of taking care of the liabilities with which a pension fund starts, always a heavy burden in a growing concern, this Episcopal church fund is considered to mark a noteworthy advance in pension history. The \$200,000 a year expenditure will be provided by a tax on the local churches which will be scientifically graduated according to the age at which its clergymen was ordained. This tax will average six per cent on the salaries.

The Episcopal pension commission in reviewing existing pension systems, intimates that many of them are really bankrupt, a condition that is not now apparent because the systems are young, but which within a few years will become evident. This bankruptcy is attributed to the neglect of proper statistical study before these pension funds were started, and to the failure to provide properly for the load of liabilities with which a pension system always begins. Episcopally mentioned as unsound is the New York state public school teachers' fund, which went into operation on August 1st of this year.

The Episcopal commission also criticizes pension systems like those of the First National Bank of New York and of Armour & Co., which keeps from an employe the interest on his pension contribution when he resigns. In many instances this is simply a device to prevent strikes. There is also criticism of a large number of pension funds, ranging from that of the International Harvester, company to that of the University of Chicago, which have rules authorizing the reduction of pensions if the funds become insufficient. The Episcopal commission considers a pension a sacred obligation, because the pensioner is helpless, and says that rules for reducing pensions are unnecessary if proper study and the proper financial arrangements have preceded its creation.

Incidentally the report discloses that ten per cent of all the Episcopal clergymen were formerly ministers in other churches.

U. S. CONSUL IN MEXICO EFFECTS YANKEES' RELEASE

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 7.—After being held prisoners by the orders of General Piquero Orozco for nine days, witnessing the execution of their guide, a Mexican cowboy, and being fired upon by federal soldiers at Rancheria, yesterday, Charles Biesel, manager of the Mine Company of America, of Chicago, and Bernard MacDonald, manager of the San Patrio Mining Company, of Parafel, and Ray Haral, their automobile driver, reached El Paso, late last night. Their release from the Chihuahua jail was secured by American Consul Letcher. Pressure from Washington was brought to bear on the federal authorities and the Americans were given a hearing after E. C. Burns, state department messenger, reached Chihuahua with messages for Consul Letcher, last week.

MacDonald said last night, that he is an American citizen not an English subject. Haral's automobile was taken from him in Chihuahua.

500 KILLED OR WOUNDED IN CANTON BATTLE

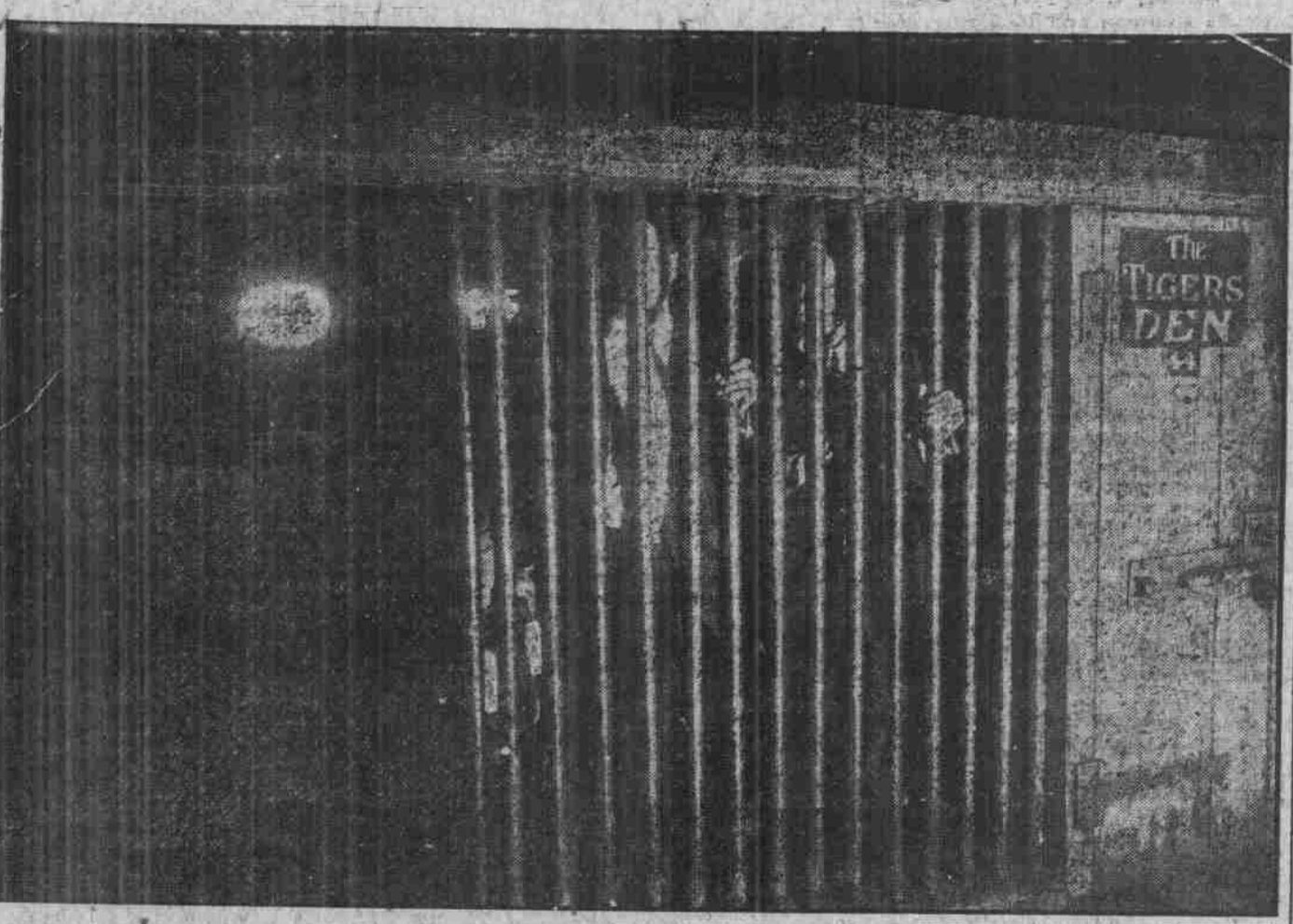

POWERS DEMAND TURKEY TO BACK FROM ADRIANOPLE

London, Aug. 7.—The representatives of the European powers took the first step at Constantinople, today, to compel Turkey to evacuate the fortress of Adrianople, which her troops re-occupied after war broke out between the former Balkan allies. The diplomatic body demanded that the Turkish government should respect the treaty signed in London between the former belligerents.

It is asserted in diplomatic circles that the contemplated action of the powers, in the event of the present demand made by them proving futile will be such as to render further hostilities between Bulgaria and Turkey unnecessary.

MAN SAID TO BE ALIVE FOR WHSE MURDER HE'S SERVING LIFE SENTENCE

Jefferson City, Mo., Aug. 7.—Jack Bennett, of this city, yesterday testified before the state board of pardons and paroles that James P. McCann, for whose murder Seymour Barrington, known as "Lord" Barrington, is serving a life sentence in the penitentiary, is alive. Bennett said he saw McCann a year after his supposed death. Barrington has asked the board to release him.
