### AMERICAN BANKERS TO HOLD CONFERENCE ON CURRENCY BILL



New York, Aug. 8.—A. Barton Hepburn, chairman of the Chase National bank directorate, acting as chairman of the currency committee of the American Bankers' association, has called a meeting of the bankers of the country for action on the currency bill. It promises to be the most important conference the association has ever had. The calling of the conference is nominally made dependent upon whether or not the Democratic caucus of the house of representatives on Aug. 11 decides to proceed with the present bill. It is practically assured, however, that the conference will be held, as bankers feel certain that the caucus will support the administration measure.
