**BRIDGEPORT LIQUOR DEALER
 ARRESTED FOR PEDDLING
 BEER WITHOUT LICENSE**

Stratford Authorities Apprehend Driver of Springfield Brewery Company Delivery Wagon.

(Special to the Farmer.)
 Stratford, Aug. 8.—On the charge of selling beer in Stratford from a wagon without the necessary license, the driver of one of the Springfield Brewing Company's delivery wagons was arrested by State Policeman Rowe Wheeler yesterday morning. It is alleged that he was delivering the beer by the case at different houses in the town and that he had no license to do so. He was released under the bond of \$200. This marks the second arrest of this kind that the state police have made in Stratford within the past week. The authorities state that they are determined to put a stop to the practice of Bridgeport liquor dealers of coming into Stratford and selling their wares without paying for the privilege by taking out a license.
