Wounds and Their Best Treatment. Probably the commonest ills that men are subject to consist of wounds of one sort or another.

Wounds are injuries of the outer tissues in any portion of the body, in which an opening is made in the skin and more or less of the deeper tissues.

Causes. Cut or incised wounds are the result of being injured with sharp cutting instruments, such as knives, razors and swords.

Wounds are also the result of being struck by blunt instruments, such as clubs, mallets, or where a person is injured by machinery or the bursting of explosives.
