**Dawes' Fight On La Follette To Be Continued in Wisconsin**  
**Republicans Plan To Carry On—Uneasy Scene As Speaker Attacks Third Party Candidate In His Home Town.**

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 12.—Republican organization leaders in Wisconsin took steps today to carry on the fight launched against La Follette's independent candidacy last night by Charles G. Dawes in an address in the Milwaukee auditorium.  
Plans for the contest in Senator La Follette's progressive home state were discussed informally by local party leaders and William Butler, republican national chairman after last night's meeting, which was attended by an audience that overflowed the auditorium. The hall has a seating capacity of 5,000.  
Republican national committee officials who accompanied Mr. Dawes here were afforded obvious indications of the strong political feeling that exists this year in Wisconsin. Cheers for Senator La Follette were heard frequently before the meeting got under way, and these cheers grew somewhat in volume when Mr. Dawes in his opening sentence mentioned the name of the Wisconsin senator.

**Atmosphere Charged**  
The atmosphere seemed to be charged with the feeling existing in the state; several of those on the platform cast somewhat apprehensive glances over the audience and those in the audience in many cases sat forward in their seats—all feeling that there might be an open demonstration of these diverse sentiments.

As Mr. Dawes proceeded with his analysis of the attitude of the La Follette-Wheeler ticket toward constitutional questions, particularly the independent platform's declaration for congressional veto of supreme court decisions, those in charge of the meeting said they noticed a lessening of the strain. There were few interruptions from unsympathetic members of the audience thereafter, except about midway in the speech when those sitting in a section near the back of the hall got up and walked noisily out. The republican organization officials estimated the number who did this at about 200 and pointed out that their places were taken immediately by an equal number from among the crowd waiting outside.

**Dawes' Address**  
Mr. Dawes devoted his entire address to a discussion of the La Follette movement, which he declared presented "the quintessence of demagogism, animated by the vicious purpose of undermining the constitutional foundation of this republic."  
He attacked Senator La Follette as "the master demagogue," described the senator's Labor day address as an affront to the common sense of the average individual, and declared the success of the La Follette doctrine of congressional veto of supreme court decisions "would mean that the constitution be stripped of authority, would be disastrous, and government would become the plaything of changing political parties with demagogues in the saddle."

Mr. Dawes declared that "in the mass of clap-trap accompanying the La Follette effort we can see one steady purpose always in mind—the attack on the constitution of the United States," and it was to this "attack" that Mr. Dawes devoted most of his attention.  
The republican nominee described Senator La Follette "the master demagogue" as "any party attempting to take a position in the half-way ground between those who favor the constitution of the United States and those who would destroy its essential parts"; declared this division to be the greatest issue of the campaign, and appealed to the voters of Wisconsin to "include the issue by a full vote of the registered voters, not by the fractional vote which, for the last four years, has been cast in Wisconsin."  
Mr. Dawes said he recognized that there were in the country "many men who are justly discontented but who are patriotic at heart."  
"They may be opposed to certain things in the existing order, but they are not opposed to the existing order of things," he added. "I warn them that they should not be deceived by the catch-all phrases of this master demagogue, endeavoring to amalgamate them with the socialist, being the red flag in an attack on the constitution of their country."  
On Labor Day Address  
The republican candidate combined with his attack on the attitude of the La Follette movement toward the constitution an appeal, on his statement made by Senator La Follette in his Labor day address.  
"In its strong appeal to the prejudices and passions of the people, the speech was unusual, but in no other way," he asserted. "Never in the history of the United States, has the common sense of the average individual received a greater affront. La Follette's speech should raise the question in the minds of the American people—Does he consider us a race of fools?"

Mr. Dawes in beginning his discussion of the La Follette movement, which he characterized as "the culmination of the most dangerous era of demagogism through which this country has ever passed," quoted the declaration in the La Follette platform for a constitutional amendment providing that congress might by enacting a statute make it effective over a judicial veto.

**Butler's Opinion**  
Chicago, Sept. 12.—William M. Butler, chairman of the republican national committee, today in a statement relative to General Dawes' address at Milwaukee last night, said:  
"Charles G. Dawes, the nominee to the republican party for vice-president is to be congratulated on the speech which he made at Milwaukee last night.  
"In the first address which he has made in the home state of the leader of the third party he concentrated his arguments on the one great issue which Senator La Follette has made: the virtual abolition of the supreme court and the substitution of congress for that judicial body.  
"There was an audience, I am advised, of some nine thousand within the hall and there were many thousands outside. The outpouring was one of the largest known in Milwaukee for some time and this great audience gave the general the closest attention and the most enthusiastic applause.  
"I desire to see for myself the interest of the Wisconsin people in this address, and so was one of the great audience. I have returned to Chicago with the conviction that the people of the state are already enlisted in the contest for the preservation of constitutional government.  
"This issue is deep in their hearts. It was impossible to sit there last night and watch the waves of enthusiasm following the words of General Dawes, without appreciating the fact."

"The government whose policy is determined by the ultimate judgment of the people will permanently survive," he added. "The government whose actions are determined by the passing phrases of popular opinion, as distinguished from ultimate opinion, will perish. The constitution of the United States establishes the rule of the people as distinguished from the rule of the mob."  
Such doctrine could not be classed as reactionary, Mr. Dawes said, adding that all good citizens should condemn the reactionary as usually pictured—"one who stands against honest progress in government and in favor of some status quo from which he is supposed to derive an unfair individual benefit."  
"The most dangerous reactionary is the man attacking the constitution of the United States," he said. "Such a man would open the way for a condition of things under which again, in poverty, confusion and misery, the people must evolve among themselves, constitutional instruments of stable and free government, under which the inalienable rights of the individual are protected from the aggressions of the majority and from government itself. Let us not deceive ourselves! The doctrines of the so-

**First Volunteer Is Also First Man to Register**

Col. T. Bentley Holt, military attaché of the embassy, also received the registrations of about 100 other persons, most of them reserve officers. The bulk of the registration was with the Paris post of the American Legion which has about 500 members, 400 of whom are in Europe. Of the latter, 150 responded to the call and more are expected to register later in the week. Eight women came to post headquarters and volunteered for Red Cross work.  
**PEOPLE MORE RELIGIOUS**  
Blame For Empty Pews Placed On Church Rather Than Those Who Fail To Attend Services  
Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 12.—The blame for decrease in church attendance was placed upon the church, its laity and clergy, rather than upon those who do not attend, by the Rev. Clinton Winder of Rochester, N. Y., in an address today before the annual convention of the Unitarian Laymen's league. People are more religious today than ever before, he asserted. The church which fails to reach the masses is the church that has failed in making adjustments to the requirements of a new generation, he said.  
Application of psychology and modern business methods to the problems of the church was recommended by him.  
"We have been liberal with our prayers and our pocketbooks, but stingy with our brains," he declared. "When the business man in the church turns the full power of his intellect upon the problems of a failing church, as he would upon the problems of a failing business, then we will get results."
