Alleged Assault Is Defendant in \$500 Suit

Charging malicious and violent assault, Charles Abruczewicz has brought suit for \$500 against Wadyslaw Kulas. Kulas was in court yesterday on a charge of assault on Abruczewicz on Sunday, but judgment was suspended when it was claimed that the plaintiff, accusing the defendant of stealing lumber, had come to his house and threatened Mrs. Abruczewicz when she did not let him see her husband. The defendant, who was in bed at the time, jumped up and hit Kulas on the head with a wooden stool. The plaintiff seeks damages to cover medical expenses and loss of work. Michael A. Sexton issued the writ, which is returnable in the city court the first Monday of May.

Big Supply of Drugs Taken in Bridgeport

Bridgeport, April 21.—Nearly \$2,000 worth of drugs in the form used by addicts were seized at Harvey's drug store, West Main street early last night after Thomas J. Keenan, in charge of the store and Walter Keefe a garage man, had been placed under arrest on charges of violation of the Harrison act, according to a police report today. The arrest of the two men came after federal officers had been in this city for the past several weeks investigating the alleged source of supply for New Haven drug addicts. Narcotic Agent Richard Kelly, Federal Agent James Crenn, Colly Detective Roland Alling, Leul, James Murphy and Patrolman George McEllicott were the officers who shadowed Keenan and Keefe and placed them under arrest on West Main street when it is alleged, a package of drugs passed from Keenan to Keefe. A third man thought by the police to be the go-between for the alleged local "dope" peddlers and the New Haven addicts was released after being questioned by the police.

BUTT CAUSES \$800 FIRE

Fire caused by a cigarette butt dropped on the seat of a coupe owned by Winston Merritt of 1903 Stanley street damaged the machine and garage in which it was kept last night before the fire department, in answer to an alarm from Box 67 about 10 o'clock, arrived and put it out. The damage was estimated at about \$800. Several other machines that were in the garage were saved from damage by the firemen, who removed them from the burning building.

Police Force Consists Of Capt. and Two Lieuts.

South Nyack, N. Y., April 21.—Enforcement of the law in this residential village today was in the hands of a police captain and two first lieutenants. Yesterday the three were patrolmen but the board of trustees promoted them at a meeting last night. Although no advance in pay is granted, the officers now wear gold badges instead of tin. At the trustees meeting it was pointed out that criminals give South Nyack a wide berth, only one man having been detained over night in the South Nyack jail in the last year.

Skull Fractured When Run Down by Motor Car

Bridgeport, April 21.—Patrick Gabbatt, 69, is at St. Vincent's hospital suffering from a fractured skull received when he was struck by an automobile driven by James J. Somerville of Fairfield early today. His condition is serious. Gabbatt was crossing the street when struck. Somerville's machine collided with another car and the driver, who lost control due to the collision and was unable to avoid striking Gabbatt.

Arrested for Passing Bad Checks; Has 2 Wives

Bridgeport, April 21.—Charges of bigamy will be lodged against Richard E. Athley of Portchester, N. Y., who is held by the police here charged with passing worthless checks. Clarence O. Lister, assistant city prosecutor announced today. An investigation into the forger's charges is said to have revealed the fact that Athley had deserted his first wife in New Rochelle, N. Y., and married Victoria Mikida, a Bridgeport girl in September, 1924. Athley's case was continued in city court today for one week and bonds were increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000.

Los Angeles Scheduled To Start at Daybreak

Lakehurst, N. J., April 21.—The dirigible Los Angeles was taken from her hangar shortly after noon today and walked out to her steel mooring mast where she will remain tied up during the afternoon preparatory to starting her second flight to Bermuda about sunset. Officers of the naval air station said they expect to arrive at Bermuda about daybreak tomorrow.
