The Painleve declaration promised hearty support for the league of nations and advocated that all countries be made members, this referring to Germany.

The government will pursue the double object of maintaining full accord with old allies and developing "the world authority of the league of nations in conformity with the wishes of all associates of veterans."

"Security, arbitration and disarmament, those are the three conditions upon which depend the Geneva protocol, the first beginning of a great international peace pact. We shall remain firmly attached to these three conditions," declared the premier.

"We shall work to prepare for the reconciliation of Europe, without which our civilization is in danger of foundering."

The declaration made a square appeal for a union of parties: "We invite co-operation by all of the citizens of France who place national sentiment above party passion and private interests."

In proposing the maintenance of a vatican representative, the declaration said, "All members of the government whatever may be their doctrinal conviction are agreed on asking you in the name of general interests not to reopen a useless controversy which is harmful to the national credit."

The vatican issue The recommendation for the vatican envoy was made because of the "necessity for taking into account the requirements of national harmony and the delicate conditions of world politics. While he will respect all beliefs and are determined to avoid troubling consciences, the government remains attached to the law separating the church and the state, and will apply it with equal quantities of fact and firmness."

The government also asked the chamber to avoid discussion of the financial question which would likely develop misunderstandings, because of the necessity of "maintain-

ing financial stability, without which ruin would threaten our freedom." Early Debt Action Premier Painleve's reference to French debts in his ministerial statement today was taken as pre-arranging early action by Finance Minister Caillaux toward funding negotiations. All of M. Caillaux's comment on the subject indicates his conviction that a settlement of debts is one of the first problems to be reached. His method, it is believed, will be to handle the negotiations himself, possibly sending his own instead of a foreign office representative to Washington.

WONDER BUNGALOW BURNS TO GROUND

Half Million Dollar Loss to F. L. Wright

Spring Green, Wis., April 21.—A bungalow, said to be one of the most beautiful in the world, and a collection of Japanese prints that were declared invaluable, were destroyed by fire here last night. They belonged to Frank Lloyd Wright, architect, who had estimated his loss at between \$250,000 and \$500,000.

The bungalow was situated on Wright's estate, three miles south of here and was of rectangular shape. The living quarters and studio were destroyed.

A number of plans for skyscrapers, upon which Wright was working also were destroyed.

Wright rebuilt the bungalow after his return from Japan, where he designed the Imperial hotel, in Tokyo, one of the few buildings that withstood the ravages of the recent earthquake.

In 1914 before the bungalow was remodelled and rebuilt, a negro named Julian Carlton, cook at the bungalow, went suddenly insane, set fire to the building, stood at the entrance with an axe and killed five and injured three others as they fled from the flames.

SPORTSMEN ACTIVE IN ENFORCING LAW

Fish and Game Assn. to Try to Educate Public

The officers and directors of the New Britain Fish and Game association held a meeting last night in the New Britain Trust Co. Resolutions were adopted on the death of Sheriff H. Clark. Arthur E. Borg was elected temporary chairman of the entertainment committee to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Clark's death.

The directors voted to recommend a change in the by-laws whereby an additional committee be formed which will be known as the law enforcement committee. This committee's duties will consist of taking care of all complaints of law breaking especially against the members of the association and a form was adopted and an order placed for printing the property owners' agreements and protective posters which are necessary as it gives the committee members something definite to work on. The committee will also strive to start a campaign of education so that the public may become familiar with the fish and game laws of the state.

Reports were received from the fish committee that the members had examined five brooks for trout and when the survey of the streams has been finished, the state will be requisitioned for stock trout to be placed in these streams.

Application has been made by the game committee, it was reported, for 150 pheasants, and the association is corresponding for more from various bird breeders.

The association will hold a meeting in May at which an effort will be made to secure cooperation of a committee from the Meriden Sportsmen's association which would include a motion picture record of the actual work being done in the state

by associations. Speakers will also be secured.

A joint meeting of the fish and game committees will be held next Monday night to complete the survey of the remaining territory.
