According to Representative Hull, chairman of the house committee of military affairs, which is now trying to put together an army bill that will be supported by all the republicans, many of whom have publicly expressed widely differing opinions of what the bill should provide for, especially as to the number of men, the volunteers in the Philippines will not be brought home until the regulars, enlisted under the bill not even yet written can be sent to take their places. At least, that is a fair construction to place upon Mr Hull's own words: "The army now in the Philippines will have to be brought home in the summer, that is, those of the men who do not care to re-enlist. The transports which go out for them should depart laden with the troops who are to replace them."

Representative Champ Clark, of Missouri, has returned to Washington, feeling as chipper as usual. He said: "I am not downcast or discouraged by the kicking we get. The most unpleasant feature is it will take us six or eight years to get the senate. As to the proposition to reorganize the democratic party, it is a fact in natural history that the fall cannot wag the dog; and the same is true in politics. The party does not need reorganizing to begin with. It is thoroughly organized, and even if it were to be reorganized, it would not be from the outside. We want everybody to come in that feels like helping us, but we have a perfect organization of our own." Of the probable work of this session of congress, Mr Clark said: "I think this will be an extremely busy session. The main thing the republicans will do will be to ratify the Hay-Panamafoe treaty and pass a Nicaragua canal bill, in accordance with it, and to pass Mark Hanna's ship-subsidy bill. If the supreme court decides the Porto Rican act unconstitutional, then the republicans will run races with us as to which will drop the Philippines first. But if it is to be decided constitutionally, then this session of congress will have to pass some kind of a bill for the government and control of the islands. This, with the routine measures and the new appointment under the last census, will make it an exceedingly busy session."

Speaking of the waste and lack of good judgment in many business concerns, a writer in the New England Engineering Magazine says that the most costly thing about a factory is an incomplete organization. Yet the cost of establishing a good one is often shrunk from like the plague. The reason is particularly obvious where the principals are not their own managers, as in the case of almost all companies. The cost of establishing a new and better system is seen at once in the pay roll; an additional clerk or a higher salary makes itself clear to the most obtuse board. "Expenses must be kept down," and so the proposal is vetoed. This may, nevertheless, be very far from clever business. The addition of \$100 a year is seen, but what is not so clearly seen is the cost of mistakes due to an organization outgrown. These are smothered. The shops can easily keep their own counsel. The ultimate result of such marked failures of co-ordination shows, of course, at the year end in diminished profit in the "Trade-a-c." But nobody knows why or wherefore. In the course of a year, several times in the cost of a highly-paid staff may easily be muddled away in a large concern, and nobody be a penny the wiser. An incompetent foreman in one single shop, in the absence of proper control, may waste the firm's resources to a perilous extent, and yet the management may be only vaguely conscious that "So-and-so is not as sharp as he might be." The money value of his want of sharpness is an unknown quantity. It ought not to be.

HEARD IN PASSING
Even the department of agriculture shares in the general tendency to increase the ordinary expenditures of the government—a tendency which is bound to make much trouble if not checked. The estimates for appropriations for the department of agriculture for the next fiscal year, now ready for submission to congress, aggregate \$24,000,000, which is an increase of 10 per cent over the appropriations for the current fiscal year.

THE public whipping of a 15-year old boy in Delaware for a small theft—unintentional, he asserts—is an abuse of the law. In the first place, the alleged offender was no young offender, and in the second, the penalty was disproportionate to the offense. The whipping post, if ever used, should be kept only for hardened criminals. It has been advocated by Judge Baldwin of this state—among others, for wife beating, and it fits that crime peculiarly. But the whipping of a boy for taking a small box of perfume from an apparently empty car was a penalty out of all proportion to the alleged crime—Bridgeport Farmer.

FATHER CURTIN'S FIERY CHARGE.

The Rev. Father Curtin of Waterbury has a mighty poor opinion of the Connecticut county commission system in general and of the New Haven county commissioners in particular. He said so, and much more, in the sermon which he preached from the pulpit of his church Sunday. Father Curtin's parish, whose area is chiefly residential, is in the midst of a severe campaign of re-monorance the licenses of several liquor dealers in his parish, against whom he protested, weren't renewed last year. Father Curtin said, however, that the entire batch of protested applications for licenses wasn't rejected. On Sunday Father Curtin took occasion to resume expression of his dissatisfaction with the administration of the liquor business over in his county. He thinks that in general the practice of having the control of the saloons, the county jails and the county homes vested in the same official board is a grand idea, and that the county commissioners, who introduce the voter to their county jail, and later receive his children into their county home, a condition of things which he had only had pride enough to consider as ridiculous. "The county commission system in Connecticut undoubtedly has some first-class weaknesses—and at them Father Curtin hits drive. Concerning the Justice of his county he aren't sufficiently acquainted with the facts to pass an opinion that is at once judicious and judicial, but speaking in general terms we think that in the matter of the personal supervision of the county commissioners of the state as a whole have greatly improved during the past ten years. Confidently we venture this opinion, though some there probably be who would trot out a challenge—Hartford Post.

A LITTLE OF ALL SORTS.

There are to-day in all countries more than 3,000,000 Italian emigrants. Smoking is forbidden on the platforms of street cars in Springfield, Mass. A toy hoop fell into a conduit at Washington recently and caused a temporary suspension of traffic. The police here prohibited the rolling of hoops in the city on this account. Through the annexation of the towns of Lake, Lake View, Hyde Park and Jefferson, the original city of Chicago has lost in the last 11 years nearly \$200,000 in rebates paid from the special assessment fund. A model of the cathedral of St. John the Divine has been under construction for the past two years. It will be a miniature building, 30 by 25 feet, with a height of 35 feet. It is on a scale of an inch to the foot. Although the sum of \$12,000,000 has been expended during the past eight years in reducing the number of Chicago's grade crossings, that city lost 23 citizens in September in grade-crossing accidents. Until the middle of the last century cavalry deployments were by two right angle turns, and when the diagonal march was adopted instead of the zig-zag by a half turn of each horse the movement was by the whole troop or unit.

POPULAR SCIENCE.

There are 798 different species of roses known. After a protracted series of experiments it has been decided to establish telephonic communication between England and Belgium, to be opened to the public about February 1, 1901. Surgeon General Van Rypen does not consider that Guam is a good naval station. He says that typhoid fever is practically endemic in the island, owing to the pollution of the drinking water. By the new Polar and Virap rapid telegraphic system the message is written by a point of light reflected from a swinging mirror at the end of a sensitized paper, and is put on the wire by means of a perforated paper running over a wheel and controlling the electric currents. Mount St. Helms has been badly shaken by an earthquake. It is said that the mountain was considerably cracked, and that a large mass of lava, which was moving from the top of the mountain, and went down into the sea, carrying everything with it.

VOTERS' TALE OF WOE.
