LOS ANGELES, May 18.—During the last six months a large, square-shouldered, athletic appearing fellow has frequently been arrested by the local police, the charge each time being drunkenness. His clothing is torn and shabby, yet he nearly always has money in his pockets. The name "Dan W. Morgan" appears upon the police records oftener than those of any other five drunks, and he has the reputation of having been sentenced more times and paid more fines than any one within 100 miles of this city.

THOUSANDS WITNESS AWFUL FALL TO DEATH

ST. LOUIS, May 18.—While fighting a fire which threatened destruction to the five-story brick building at 1101 to 1105 Olive street this afternoon Edward Green, assistant foreman of engine company No. 22, slipped from a line of hose upon which he was descending from the roof to a ladder and was dashed to death on the stone pavement sixty feet below. The accident was witnessed by several thousand people who had gathered to watch the fire.

TURKEY PROHIBITS ENTRY OF TYPEWRITERS

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 18.—The customs authorities have prohibited the entry of typewriters into Turkey, and 200 machines now in the custom-house have been ordered returned to the consignor. The authorities have taken up the peculiar characteristic attitude that there is no distinct feature about typewriting by which the authorship can be recognized or a person using a machine be traced, and that consequently any one is able to put in type seditious writings without fear of compromising himself.

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MEMBERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN REVISION COMMITTEE

Result Expected by the Presbyterian Revision Committee.

Report Submitted for Consideration by General Assembly

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—Contrary to expectations, the Presbyterian General Assembly did not discuss the report of the committee on revision of the creed of faith, which was to-day presented to the commissioners. Thursday and Friday next were set aside for the discussion of revision. Appended to the report of the twentieth century fund committee were resolutions which urge churches still burdened with indebtedness to take steps to remove such within the next two years; requesting congregations and individual members to "prayerfully consider the enlarged needs and larger opportunities of the boards of the theological seminaries, of the academic, collegiate and charitable institutions of the church, and speedily to provide for those greater needs as the Lord may enable them to do"; calling upon the synods and the Presbyterians to "continue to prosecute this work during the ensuing year by organized effort and the hearty cooperation with the general committee."

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After the patient consideration given to this important subject, and after a protracted and harmonious discussion of the subject, all its bearings and in its possible issues, it was determined to submit to the general assembly in Philadelphia, May 19, 1901, the following findings and recommendations, viz.: 1. That the returns indicate that the church desires some changes in its creedal statements.

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The members of the committee appointed by the last assembly unanimously agreed to all the findings and recommendations of this report, with the exception that Rev. Dr. William McKibbin and E. C. W. Humphrey should not be approached with a recommendation to the assembly to instruct the committee that might be appointed to prepare a summary of the reforms suggested by the report.

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In conclusion we feel justified in the statement, and we think it fitting to state, that the committee on church polity, General Benjamin Harrison, gave clear expression to views before the assembly. We are confident that we would have joined us in the findings and recommendations of this report.

The report of the committee on missions and benevolent offerings was most commendable, and a recommendation is made to the committee on church polity that they instruct a committee that might be appointed to prepare a summary of the reforms suggested by the report.

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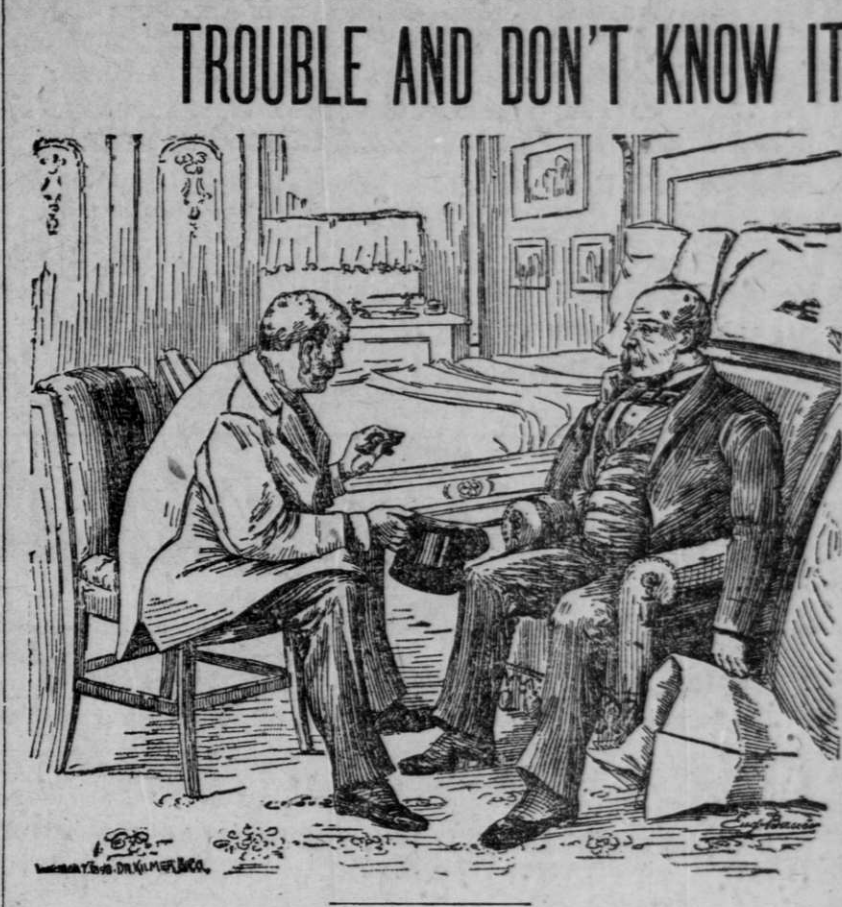
The component parts of a particular church are: the sessions, the deacons, the communicants, the members, the church school, the Sabbath school, with its scholars, teachers and officers; the various societies or agencies organized for the carrying on of Christian life and development of Christian life.

The Rev. Dr. George T. Purves of New York made a motion referring the report to the committee on church polity, which he said he feared such an addition to the report would introduce a new definition of the church and that this definition might be used to the serious detriment of the church in the fact that Sunday school members would not be allowed a vote in church meetings.

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PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—Judge McPherson in the United States Circuit Court, to-day handed down an opinion in the suits of the Spreckels Refining Company to recover \$106,619 tax taxes paid to the Government under protest. The suits were instituted against Penrose & McClain, internal revenue collector of the district. The court decides the act to be constitutional and an excise but not a direct tax and holds that Collector McClain was justified in collecting the tax monthly, and not annually.

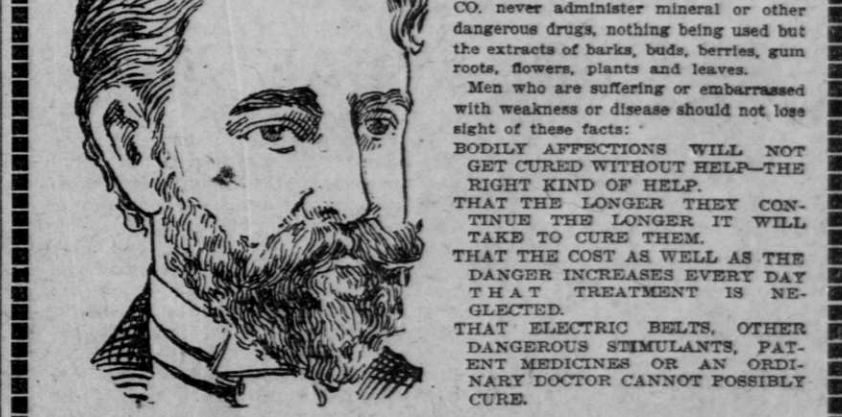
Seven-Masted Schooners
