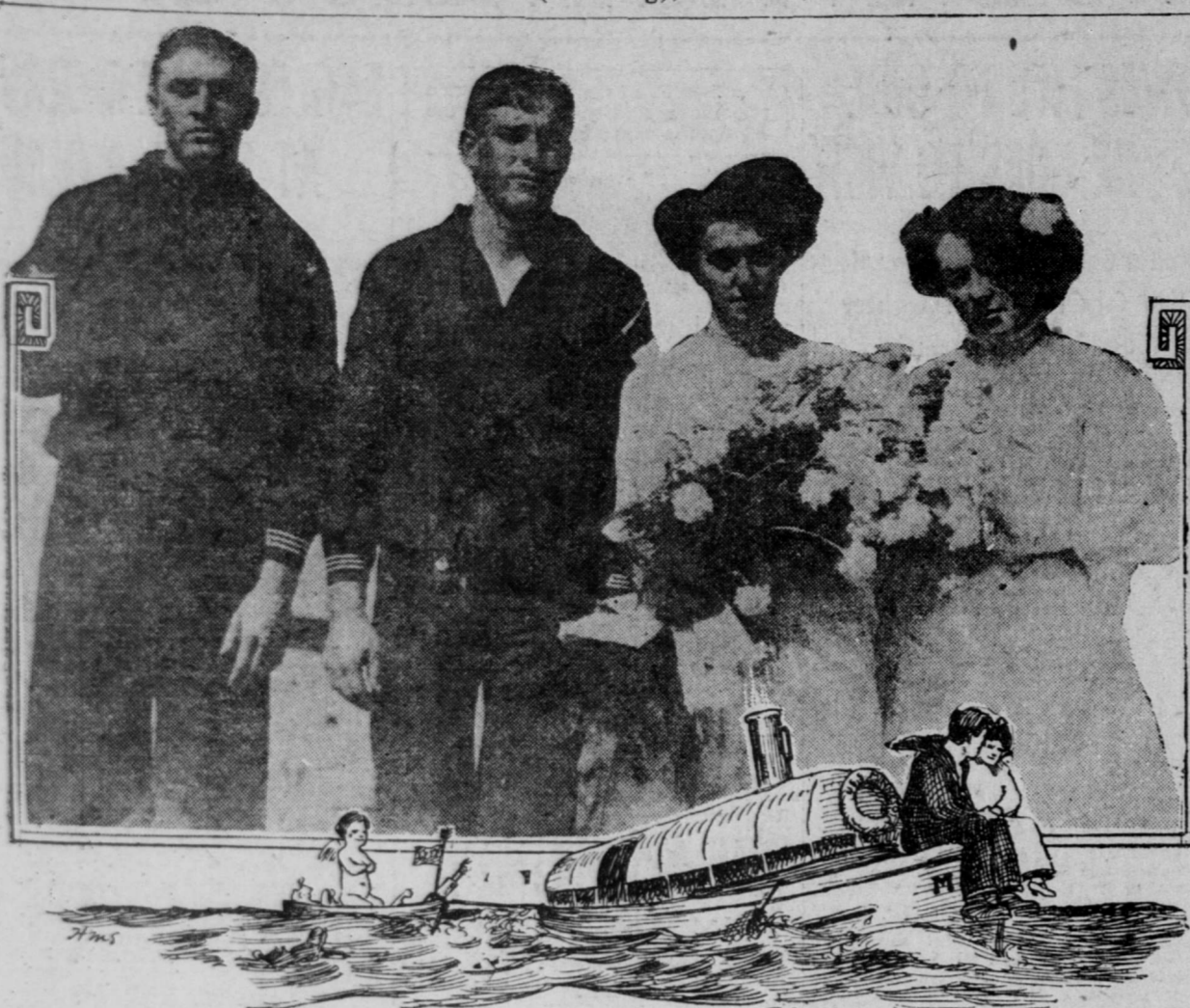

SALOR IS WED ON BATTLESHIP'S DECK

Claims Bride at Altar Between Big Guns Amid Cheers of Officers and Men

Before an altar erected on the quarterdeck of the battleship Minnesota and flanked on either side by the two grim 12-inch turret guns, Seaman Harry L. Heilman and Miss Rose King, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles King, 429 Linden street, were married yesterday afternoon.

It was the first time in the annals of the American navy that a bluejacket had been married on the quarterdeck of a battleship.

The knot was tied by Chaplain Evans of the Minnesota. Promptly at 3 o'clock in the afternoon the church pennant, a white field with a blue cross, was hoisted to the peak.

As the ceremony ended a spontaneous cheer burst from the Minnesota's crew and there was a general break to shower the couple with rice.

They carried the rice in their caps and in their enthusiasm simply emptied them over the heads of the lucky pair.

Captain Hubbard and the officers took as keen an interest in the wedding as did the enlisted men.

REASSEMBLE SHIPS FOR WORLD CRUISE

Twelve War Vessels Now in the Bay and Supply Ships Are on Way to Honolulu

The initial steps of the journey of the 16 battleships around the world were taken yesterday afternoon when the Glacier and the Culgoza, two auxiliary vessels, steamed out of Golden Gate harbor bound for Honolulu.

The reassembling of the warships for the big cruise is well on its way. There are 11 of the battleships now in the harbor.

The Wisconsin is expected today. The Kentucky arrived yesterday afternoon from Bremerton navy yard.

The Missouri, though ready to put to sea, was ordered to remain at Mare Island until Wednesday, when it will join the others.

The Rhode Island, Keokuk and Virginia are expected to be in the harbor not later than next Thursday. They have been undergoing a general overhauling at the Bremerton navy yard.

The cruise of the torpedo boat flotilla ended on its arrival at San Francisco. The torpedo boats and destroyers have already been amalgamated with the Pacific fleet and will remain on this coast.

The battleship Nebraska, Captain Nicolson, arrived in port late yesterday afternoon, three days from Bremerton, and joined the fleet in man of war row.

AMBASSADOR SUMMONED

Creel Is Ordered to Washington From Vacation

CITY OF MEXICO, June 28.—Ambassador Enrique C. Creel has been directed to proceed to Washington immediately.

This sudden change in the plans of the ambassador, who had received a long leave of absence from his government with the intention of spending a number of months in his home state of Chihuahua, was occasioned by the recent raid made on the town of Las Vacas.

Mexico will ask that certain of the ringleaders who may be captured on United States soil be tried by the courts of that nation.

MEXICAN TROOPS AGAIN IN BATTLE

Clash With Insurgents Results in Casualties on Both Sides

TORREON, Mex., June 28.—General Jose Villar, commander of the military zone for northern Mexico, with a large body of troops marching overnight to Las Vacas, had a sharp battle with revolutionists today.

Several bands of revolutionists have torn up the track of the Mexican international railroad and cut the telegraph wires at a number of places between Torreon and Jaral.

Two hundred Mexican soldiers arrived from Diaz this afternoon, and are in close pursuit of the insurgent band, that is feeling into the mountains to the northwest of Las Vacas.

Among the newspapermen to slip across the Rio Grande this afternoon was E. S. O'Reilly, who had Jose Hernandez, a Mexican, for a guide.

W. BROOKS JONES COMMITS SUICIDE

Poison Ends Life of Insurance Man Who Squandered Fortune in Overindulgence

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL LOS ANGELES, June 28.—His fortune squandered, his mind and body wrecked through overindulgence in drugs, his wife and his young daughter gone, W. Brooks Jones ended his life today by swallowing poison in a Los Angeles lodging house.

After that came dissipation, long stays at sanitariums by Jones, and eventually he was sent to the Southern California Hospital for the Insane at Patton. Altogether he spent about two years at that institution, three times being discharged as cured.
