IS IT BURNETT?

There is usually a difference in the pronunciation of the names Burnett and Burnet but none necessarily in meaning, though there were several ways in which the name have at different times and in different places had their origin.

In most cases the old Teutonic first name Burnard, with the meaning of strong bear or strong bear of strong warrior. From this we derive the first name Burnard, whence such surnames as Burnett, Burnet, Barnett and Barnard. In some cases the surname Burnett or Burnet may belong to the group of color name.

Burnet in that case being a diminutive of brown, or it may have been derived as a nickname from a material well known as burnet in old England.

It would seem that all our American Burnets might be traced ultimately to Scotland. The founder of one family was Thomas Burnet who was born in Scotland and came to Mass., and from thence to Southampton, L. I., where he was living in 1643. His second wife was Mary Pierson and by her he had eleven children. The ninth, Daniel, removed to Elizabeth N. J. His son Ichabod, born in Southampton was educated in Edinburgh as a physician and his son William, known as Dr. William Burnet, the elder, was born at Lyons Farm, N. J., in 1736.

He was one of the foremost Revolutionary patriots of New Jersey, was a delegate to Continental Congress and established a military hospital in Newark, N. J. By his wife, Mary Camp, he had eleven children. His second wife was Gertrude, daughter of Nicholas Gouverneur, and a widow of Anthony Rutgers.

One of his children by the first wife, known as Dr. William Burnet, the younger, was the father of Mary Burnet who married Chief Justice Joseph Hornblower, and they were parents of a family of charming daughters among whom could be counted the wives of Judge Lewis Woodruff, Justice Bradley, Gov. William Pennington, and Judge Jacob Burnet. By the second wife—Gertrude—Dr. William Burnet the older had three famous sons, Isaac Gouverneur, Burnet and David Gouverneur Burnet. And Jacob Burnet, David's son, was the first president of Texas. Isaac G. was mayor of Cincinnati, and Jacob, was United States senator from Ohio and a patron of letters and education.

William Burnet colonial governor of New York and New Jersey and later of Massachusetts, was directly related to this family though there may be some kinship in Scotland. He was born in the Hague, Holland, in 1688, the son of Gilbert Burnet bishop of Salisbury, England—one of the most brilliant and able Englishmen of his day. Gilbert was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, and his father was Robert Burnet of an Aberdeen family. Gilbert's mother was a sister of Lord Warristoun. Bishop Gilbert Burnet's first wife was Lady Margaret, daughter of the Earl of Cassilis—a prominent woman of her day. The second wife and mother of the bishop's seven children was Mary

Scott a wealthy Dutch lady of Scotch extraction. She possessed great beauty. William was one of her children. He was compeller of customs in England but gave up that post when appointed governor of New York and New Jersey. Later he was governor of Massachusetts and died in Boston in 1729.

ROBBED, THEN LEFT UNCONSCIOUS

CHESTER, Pa., Jan. 2.—Attacked and murdered by two colored thugs near Third and Flower streets, Chester, Cornelius Galvin, 53, of 900 Highland avenue, was left for dead by his assailants. Galvin was found two hours after the attack took place bleeding freely and numbed by the blows and cold and rain. He was hurried to the Chester Hospital, where it was found that his skull had been fractured and he also suffered internal injuries. Little hope is held out by the hospital authorities for his recovery. After making the assault the Negroes fled, taking with them \$4, all the money Galvin had in his pockets, and a portion of his clothing.

Galvin told the police that he can recognize one of the men if he is captured.
