ORGANIZING FOR THE CITY ELECTION.

The preliminary movements of the Republican organization have commenced for the season, looking to the City Election, early in September. Last evening, a meeting of Republicans was held and a Committee appointed to nominate a City Executive Committee for the coming year.

The City Election, in fact, is some seven or eight weeks distant, and so our good citizens who luxuriate by the sea-side, or among the mountains, or at the Springs, during July and August, and only return home when all the nominations have been made, and the election is close at hand, have probably not begun to think about the matter. The political crowd, however, are beginning to be agitated; and the notes of preparation now heard are but the preludes to early and active operations, on a more extensive scale.

The city officers to be elected this year, are the President of Council and ten members of that body, City Treasurer, two Assessors, and two Receivers of Taxes, besides the usual Ward election officers. The term of Mr. Maris, as president of Council, expires, with that of the following members: P. B. Husted, First Ward; William H. Quinn, Second Ward; J. F. Pineson, Third Ward; John G. Baker, Fourth Ward; H. P. Fickler, Fifth Ward; Philip Quigley, Sixth Ward; Philip W. McDowell, Seventh Ward; G. B. Underwood, Eighth Ward; Christian Fogler, Ninth Ward; Dennis J. Meaton, Tenth Ward. The present City Treasurer, Capt. Kilgore, declines a re-election.
