TO THE VOTERS OF SUSSEX COUNTY,  
FELLOW CITIZENS:—

The Committee of the American Republican Party of your County, have after mature deliberation made out a ticket which is acknowledged to be composed of some of the best and firmest men of our party. But how will his profession of friendship and consistency to his party rules, bear investigation, when he has already announced to the public that he will run even though he should obtain but ten votes. Then fellow-citizens you are called upon to decide between the two candidates for the office of Sheriff, one who has according to the rules and regulation of his party been nominated and the other who after offering himself to the same committee, then turns against his party, and though he requested those of the committee who were elected has his friends, in case he could not succeed himself to vote for Mr. Redden, then to oppose his nomination and become the candidate against him. Is this fair? Is it honest, or just and will any member of our party sacrifice their duty to their party, to depart from their regular nomination? I trust not. We have always as a party supported the fair nomination of the committee, and for one I feel disposed to use every fair and honorable exertion for the present ticket.
