

Alabama Board Releases Scottsboro Case Convict

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 7.—Andy Wright, last of the famed "Scottsboro Case" defendants still in prison, was ordered released yesterday by the State Pardon Parole Board.

The 38-year-old Negro was given his freedom after a brief hearing during which he told the board he hoped to stay out of

trouble in the future "and I believe I can make a go of it."

Under the conditions of his parole, Wright will work as a porter in a hospital somewhere in New York State, but board members refused to name the city. He will leave Kilby Prison here Friday.

It is the second parole for Wright, one of the nine Negroes originally charged with raping two white women on a freight train at Paint Rock, Ala., March 25, 1931.

Troops Withdrawn From Enka Factory

MORRISTOWN, Tenn., June 7.—National Guard troops began withdrawing from the struck American Enka Corp. plant here today on orders from Gov. Gordon Browning.

Gov. Browning yesterday ordered the withdrawal after union officials assured him there will be no more violence at the rayon plant.

The Governor said some of the 220 guardsmen will be sent home while others will move to the Morristown armory 5 miles away.

The CIO Textile Workers Union of America urged a Senate investigation of what it called the use of Guardsmen to "terrorize" the strikers. The request was submitted by Emil Rieve, union president, to a labor-management relations subcommittee of the Senate Labor Committee.

Several members of the committee studied the situation yesterday, but they will not make a decision until the full committee meets Tuesday, according to Chairman Murray, Democrat, of Montana.

Gov. Browning moved in the Guardsmen May 29 in response to an appeal by local authorities.

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
