Householders — Further Protests Relative to Changing Street Names

The increasing amount of foreign matter received with garbage collections is the subject of a complaint filed with the Commissioners by the Washington Fertilizing Company, the concern which has the city contract for the removal of garbage from the District. The complaint is voiced in two letters, one from the president of the company, M. M. Parker, and the second from A. J. Morse, superintendent of the garbage crematory.

Broken shells, in cans, crub shells, and other foreign matter is what the objection is aimed at, and Mr. Parker claims that it costs the company about \$2,00 per annum for extra help to remove this toreign matter, besides extensive dumage to press cloths in the factory, even a greater loss to the company. #### DIED FROM NATURAL CAUSES. Mrs. Rustin's Death Not Due to Hus. band's Blow.

autopsy at the morgue yesterday upon the body of Minerva Rustin, a col ored weman about forty-five years old, revealed the cause of death to be tubercular meningitis. While at Freedman's Hospital, before death, the woman stated that her husband had struck her upon

the head and that she had suffered from the blow ever since. It was to settle the direct cause of death that the autopsy The case attracted considerable attention for a time, as the woman's statement seemed to indicate assault, and possibly murder. The sheriff of Hanover County,

Va., where the supposed assault was sold to have been committed, has ignored the telegraphic request of Captain Boardman that the circumstances be investigated. Mrs. Rustin came to Washington abo two weeks ago, with her stepdaughter, Annie, and secured a room at 61 Annie, and secured a room at 611 New Hampshire Avenue northwest. Last Tuesday she became very ill and when she was removed to Freedman's Hospital in the evening she had relapsed into unconsciousness. The following evening she apparently regained the use of her mental faculties and in a lucid interval told the physician in charge that she had been hit on the head by her husband. After that she again sank into a state of coma and died Thursday morning.

The hospital authorities at once notified the police officials, and the Coroner directed that the body be removed to the morgue. The detectives learned that Mrs. Rustin was from Old Church Fostoffice, Hanover County, Va., and that her husband had never been in this city. Captain Boardman then telegraphed the facts in the case to the sheriff of the county, with the request that he immediately advise the Washington authorities as to particulars of the affair.

Two days have elapsed, but nothing has yet been heard from the sheriff, and yesterday an autopsy was performed upon the body by Acting Coroner Glazebrook, with the result previously stated. It having thus been shown that death was not due to violence, but to natural causes, the case was abandoned by the police and the body delivered to the relatives. Hampshire Avenue northwest.
