

ARTILLERY AND INFANTRY GO TO MEXICAN BORDER

The War Department Orders Three Regiments and Three Batteries to Naco.

DECISION BY CABINET

Sent in Response to Request of Gen. Bliss for Additional Troops.

THE FORCE WILL TOTAL 4,000

Machine Guns to Be Carried Along. Will Be Prepared for Possible Infantry Attack.

Another step which may lead to decisive action for the protection of the people of Naco, Ariz., from Mexican bullets was taken yesterday.

Gen. Bliss Requests Troops.

In view of conditions on the border, as he sees them, Gen. Bliss has requested that additional infantry and artillery be sent him.

Soldiers Will Total 4,000.

These additions to the United States forces at Naco will make the total number of soldiers there about 4,000.

United States Will Be Prepared.

When the artillery was sent to Naco ten days ago it was understood the plan was that if diplomatic measures failed the gun would be used to throw shells over the town of Naco.

Flotilla of Submarines Unfit, Asserts Stirling

Commander Says Administration Has Neglected Vessels, and that of Seventeen in Atlantic Waters Many Cannot Dive—Hobson Would Call Roosevelt to Testify.

A criticism of the present administration of the Navy Department for its neglect of the Atlantic submarine flotilla was voiced before the House Committee on Naval Affairs yesterday by Commander Yates Stirling.

"In Bad" with Daniels.

Commander Stirling already is in the bad graces of Secretary Daniels and some of his aides because of a caustic report Stirling made to the department in November last relative to the state of the Atlantic flotilla.

Must Sink American Navy.

In the first place, according to Commander Stirling, an enemy that contemplated taking any of the large cities would first find it expedient to sweep the American fleet from the sea.

Many Ships Unfit.

Taking up the seventeen submarines in the Atlantic flotilla, Commander Stirling said that of the four boats of type K in New York harbor, two had failed to come up to their contract stipulations.

Cannot Sink Dreadnought.
