CONCLUSION OF WEDNESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The 2d resolution of the report of the committee was taken from the table, and after discussion adopted.

The following was offered by Dr. Cole: A resolution was proposed to organize an education society for the Northwest, to have in charge the establishment of the proposed Theological Seminary.

In place of which, Dr. House proposed the following: Resolved, That a committee be appointed to correspond with the churches and obtain from them an expression upon the question of Theological Seminary.

The committee recommended that the convention appoint a general Executive Committee of the Northwest, whose duty it shall be to lay this whole subject before the churches of their respective States, and to direct from them or through their District Associations, General Association or State Synods.

The report of the Committee was fully discussed.

On motion, it was resolved that the several delegations here present nominate the members of the Executive Committee from their respective States.

The President was authorized to nominate the members of the Executive Committee from the unrepresented States and Territories.

An adjournment to the 10th inst. was ordered.
