Remitting Money Abroad

25TH DECORATION GIVEN U. S. MAJOR
Samuel I. Johnson's Latest Honor Is Awarded by China for Work in Siberia.

MANILA, P. I., May 15.—Major Samuel I. Johnson, who commanded the allied garrison and the military police at Vladivostok for eighteen months during the war and up to the time when the American forces evacuated Siberia, has just been awarded his twenty-fifth decoration by various nations of the earth for meritorious service and heroism under fire.

His latest decoration was given by the Chinese Government and is known as the Fourth Order of the Wen Hu, or Striped Tiger. The award was made "in token of the high appreciation of service on behalf of Chinese citizens" while Major Johnson was in charge of the allied provost guard at Vladivostok. After the American forces evacuated Siberia Major Johnson resigned from the army and became general manager of one of the largest lumbering companies in the Philippine Islands, and now is a resident of the island of Negros. The award is held at Fort Santiago, headquarters of the Philippine department of the army, and will be presented to Major Johnson on his next visit to Manila.

Major Johnson had under his command at Vladivostok troops, including Americans, British, French, Belgian, Italian, Russian, Serbian, Chinese, Japanese and Czechoslovak. All of these nations decorated him for meritorious service and besides he wears decorations from Argentina and other South American countries. His first decoration was received when only seventeen years old while fighting with the Cossacks in Southern Russia, his native country, against Tartar cavalry.

When America entered the great war Major Johnson was at the head of the National Guard of Hawaii. After a few months' training at Schofield Barracks, Honolulu, he was given a commission as major. Besides the decorations bestowed by the principal nations, he has won many medals in swimming contests and on the rifle range.

TO BE BAPTIZED AT PRINKIPO.
Babies Gain Luck, Legend Says, at Island Wilson Made Famous.

PRINKIPO, Princes Islands, May 13.—Babies in large numbers are being brought here from Constantinople to be blessed by Father Dionysius, the sole monk remaining in the monastery of St. George, which tops the 425-foot summit of this Marmora Sea island. The legend has spread that babies so blessed will have long life, health and happiness. To the outside world the island is better known because of the proposal of President Wilson to hold the Bolshevik conference here.

Father Dionysius, a native of Sparta, is now 80 years old. He has been here for thirty years, save for a short imprisonment by the Turks during the great war.

CUT IN DIAMOND MINES.
Working Force in South Africa Being Reduced.

JAGERPONTREIN, South Africa, May 15.—There has been further retrenchment in the diamond mines here and underground work has ceased. It is estimated that the employees will shortly number only 60 European and 800 boys, compared with 800 and 3,000, respectively, before the war.

The men who are leaving will receive two months' pay. Many families have already left the town and business is at a standstill.
