**CURFEW SOUNDED ON YOUNG SKATERS**

Judge De Lacy Puts Ban on Nocturnal Rolling.

**SIGNAL CORPS AID FOR THE MILITIA**

Lieut. Foulois at Head of New Army School.

Judge De Lacy is strongly opposed to permitting roller skating after dark. He expressed his views on the subject at the Juvenile Court yesterday, when Edward Gibson, of 311 Second street southeast, and John Williams, of 843 Second street southeast, were arraigned, charged with throwing stones at the automobile of Abe Cohen, of 418 Twelfth street northwest, while skating Thursday night on Virginia avenue southeast.

Mr. Cohen testified that as he was motoring with friends, a gang of colored boys on roller skates caught hold of the machine. Cohen says that he was warned the boys to keep away from the car, but was greeted by a volley of stones. Johnny and Edward were arrested following the bombardment.

"I am determined to do all I can to break up this practice of roller skating at night among the children of the city," said Judge De Lacy to the young defendants. "I have seen young girls skating at it at night."

"Now, young men, I want you to spread the news broadcast that I am going to put an end to this nocturnal skating. You young hoodlums have got to stop this practice, or prosecutions will follow. If you see each other and place you on six months' probation."

Beginning next Monday, the Signal Corps will inaugurate instruction of the National Guard in aeronautical and other signal corps work.

Lieut. Benjamin D. Foulois, who has been on duty at San Antonio, Tex., patrolling the Mexican border as a signal corps air scout, will be in charge of the new branch of militia affairs under the War Department. Lieut. Foulois, perhaps the most experienced of army aviators, will take up his new duties in the Goodwin Building, Pennsylvania avenue and Seventeenth street, the first of the week.

About twenty-eight or twenty-nine States now have signal corps, and their chiefs will report direct to Lieut. Foulois, with a view to receiving aid in instruction and possibly equipment. War Department Signal Corps officers and men will be detailed from time to time to act with militia signal corps commands, during the maneuvers, encampments, etc. In order to bring the militia signal corps into greater preparedness, Brig. Gen. James Allen, Chief Signal Officer, said yesterday:

"Lieut. Foulois is not detached from Signal Corps aeronautical work. He will continue flying, and will keep in practice at College Park, when weather permits. He will have entire charge of the militia signal corps work. Another officer, not yet selected, will be detailed to go to San Antonio, where we are keeping one aeroplane, and continue flights at that point, where there is a large army post, and where we intend to retain our aviation station."

"There seems a prospect now that we shall soon be able to get more officers, for which we are very glad."

**Would Lock Up Stock Issue.**

Floyd A. Roman yesterday asked the court to issue an injunction preventing Charles V. Hickey and the Telephone Lock and Call Register Company from transferring any of the shares issued to Hickey, also to enjoin the company from receiving any assignment of stock. The court is also asked to appoint a receiver of the stock, subject to the order of the court.

**WILL BOOST EXPORTS.**

District Delegates to the Manufacturers' Convention.

Henry C. Finkelstein and Dr. Arnauld W. Belmont were appointed by the Commissioners yesterday as delegates to the second annual convention of the American Manufacturers' Export Association, in New York, September 25 and 26.

The delegates were appointed in place of A. C. Morris and E. C. Graham, who were named by the Commissioners last week, but who found it impossible to accept. As no District funds are available, the delegates will be required to pay their expenses.

**CARTER CLEARED BROTHER OF DEBT**

Montana Statesman Left His Estate to Family.

The will of Thomas H. Carter, late United States Senator from Montana, was filed for probate yesterday. The instrument, written in ink in small script by the statesman himself, covers exactly one page of legal foolscap, is dated May 15, 1911, and witnessed by Edson H. Child of the Union Trust Company, Irving Zippel, of Fifteenth and H streets northwest, and W. Frank D. Herron, 1230 Park road northwest.

It is directed by the testator that all notes and claims held by him at the date of the will against his brother, Edward J. Carter, be handed to said brother in full settlement of their affairs.

Mrs. Julia C. Lank, a sister of Senator Carter, is to receive \$50 a month for life

**STORY BRANDED AS FAKE.**

Assistant Attorney General Fowler was annoyed yesterday when he read a story which purported to be an authoritative announcement of the Department of Justice on the department's attitude toward trusts. The statement, widely printed, was in quotations, giving it the appearance of having been issued by Attorney General Wickersham, or at his direction. Mr. Fowler publicly branded the story as a "fake."

"It is the creation of a nimble brain," declared the Assistant Attorney General. "No such statement was issued or will be issued. It is a purely imaginative on the part of a reporter."

**OFFICERS SHIFTED IN DISTRICT GUARD**

Col. Harvey, Second Infantry, Makes New Deal.

Under the new law, which enables regimental commanders to shift their officers to staff positions by rotation, a complete change was ordered by Col. William E. Harvey, of the Second Infantry, District National Guard, yesterday. Chief among the changes was that of moving Capt. John E. Brooks, now regimental adjutant, from his present post and putting him in command of Company E. This was done at the request of the lieutenants of Company E, and on the application of Capt. Brooks.

First Lieut. Edward F. Davis will succeed Capt. Brooks as adjutant.

Other changes are:

First Lieut. Clarence L. Adams, relieved from duty as acting adjutant, Second Battalion, but will continue duties with Company G.

Second Lieut. Winthrop Brown, relieved from duty with Company K, but will continue on duty as acting adjutant, Third Battalion.

Second Lieut. Chester M. Reiss, relieved from duty with Company M and assigned to Company B.

Second Lieut. George E. Tolson, relieved from duty as quartermaster and commissary, Third Battalion, and assigned to duty with Company M.

Second Lieut. Clifford G. Gardner, relieved from duty as acting quartermaster and commissary, Second Battalion, and with Company E, and assigned to duty with Company M.

Second Lieut. John H. Cole, assigned to duty as quartermaster and commissary, Third Battalion, and in addition will assist the regimental adjutant.

Acting Lieut. Henry J. Stambach, relieved from duty with Company B and assigned as adjutant and acting quartermaster and commissary of the Second Battalion.

Second Lieut. Charles M. Hammond, relieved from duty with Company B and assigned to duty as acting adjutant and commissary and quartermaster of the First Battalion.

Second Lieut. Robert W. Hancock, relieved from duty as acting quartermaster and commissary, First Battalion, but will continue on duty with Company A.

The new commander of E Company was first commissioned as first lieutenant and lieutenant adjutant, Third Battalion, Second Infantry, February 1, 1907. Prior to that time he had served as an enlisted man in the old Washington Light Infantry Corps, and in Company M, Second Infantry, D. C. N. G. In June, 1902, he was commissioned captain, Second Infantry, and detailed as adjutant, which position he has held since. The company in which he will have command is one of the best in the Guard.
