RESOLUTIONS AIMS AT IMPEACHMENT OF M'DERMOTT

Offered by Representative MacDonald, Bull Moose, It Causes Uproar in House. LIVELY DEBATE ENSUES

Entire Matter, Including Report on Mulhall Charges, Finally is Referred to Judiciary Committee.

The right of Representative James F. McDermott, of the Fourth Illinois district, whose name was mentioned in a rather unenviable manner in the Mulhall charges, to hold his seat in Congress, is challenged in a resolution presented in the House yesterday by Representative William J. MacDonald, Bull Moose member from Michigan. Mr. MacDonald offered another resolution proposing to adjudge in contempt of the House certain officers of the National Association of Manufacturers, whose activities before committees of Congress were disclosed in the report filed by the special committee created by the House to probe charges made by Col. Martin M. Mulhall.

EXPLORER'S BOAT ADRIPT.

Message Tells of Loss of Vilhjalmur Stefansson's Vessel.

OTTEWA, Ont., Dec. 9.—Since September 10 the steam whaler Karluk of Vilhjalmur Stefansson's arctic expedition has been fast in the ice, drifting northward in the Arctic Circle east of Point Barrow. Stefansson, who is not with the boat, told the story in a message received here by George J. Desbarats, acting minister of marine and fisheries. The dispatch was dated October 28.
