FIGURES SHOW CAUSE OF BOYCOTT ON EGGS. According to Department of Labor, Washington's Highest Mark Was 48 Cents.

Figures given out yesterday by the Department of Labor, showing the rise and fall in the price of eggs in November of each year since 1907 testify to the cause of the present nation-wide boycott. According to this schedule the price of eggs climbed to 75 cents per dozen in New York and Newark, N. J., last month, with a low level in those cities of 49 and 48 cents respectively.
