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FOREIGN NEWS.

PROGRESS OF THE CATTLE PLAGUE IN ENGLAND.

The Turkish Parliament About to Petition the Sultan for the Recall and Fission of the Bismarck Ministry.

London, April 9. - The cattle plague has broken out at Willenden, in Middlesex county, on a large dairy farm. The entire farm herd of 160 milch cows is affected. Within three weeks the number of cows is expected to be reduced to two or three thousand, nearly all of whose milk goes to London.

TURKEY. - THE TURKISH PARLIAMENT ABOUT TO PETITION THE SULTAN FOR THE RECALL OF MIDHAT PASHA.

Constantinople, April 9. - The Turkish Parliament is about to petition the Sultan for the recall of Midhat Pasha. Considerable agitation respecting the late recall of the Minister of Finance is still prevalent, especially among a large body of Boshaks, who considered him their leader.

THE MISSISSIPPI JETTIES.

South Report of General Comstock - Showing the Progress of the Works.

The sixth report of General Comstock, the Government engineer charged with the inspection of the progress of the works for the improvement of the South Pass of the Mississippi river, under J. B. Eads, was received at the War Department yesterday.

At the mouth of the South Pass, a few new wing dams have been built and some old ones repaired; about 16,000 yards of material have been dredged out at points where the channel was the narrowest...

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THE DEPT. COLLECTOR BEING IN COLLISION WITH THE DEFENDING IMPORTER.

While the ten cases are being examined the other goods are delivered to the consignees.

The examination is completed the appraiser makes out the invoice and the goods are delivered to the consignees. The entry is liquidated upon the basis of the ten cases of cheap stuff.

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AFRICAN REDEMPTION.

As Proposed by Secretary Sherman - Silver to be Redeemed by the Treasury.

Congress on the 23d of July, 1876, passed a joint resolution authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to exchange \$100,000,000 in silver for legal-tender notes, said notes to be again put in circulation when a like amount of fractional currency had been redeemed in other money than silver coin.

The action of Secretary Sherman to day in ordering that the legal tenders be withdrawn from the general Treasury balance, and be kept only for the redemption of silver coin, is another step in the specie resumption measure.

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THE NEW YORK MYSTERY.
