Soldier and Writer Become Members of Legion of Honor: Britain Honors Fighters

PARIS, Feb. 15.—During the dinner at the Cercle Volnay last night at which General Hoover, Director General of the International Relief Organization, was the principal speaker, Minister of Commerce Clementel decorated General Charles G. Dawes, chief of the American purchasing service, a Commander of the Legion of Honor and Ernest H. Simonds, a New York newspaper writer, a Knight of the Legion of Honor.

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U. S. Must Meet Europe's Dream Says Dr. Odell

Standard of Democracy Set by American Soldiers Is Far Above Us, He Asserts

His subject was, "What the boys will have for us—that we must have for the boys." His sermon was a string of indictments against the inertia of the Church.

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Shantung Offered To Japan by China For Kiaochau Port

Secret Agreement Sought in 1915 for Disposition of German Possessions Disclosed in Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—China was prepared in 1915 to give full assent to any arrangements which might be made between Japan and Germany for disposition of all German possessions in the Province of Shantung, provided Japan, when such assent was given, would restore to China the German base at Kiaochau and recognize the right of China to participate in the Japanese-German negotiations.

The fact is disclosed in the full text, obtained here today, of the agreement which China proposed to Japan in that year as a counter proposition to the famous "group V demands" in the twenty-one demands made upon China by the Tokyo government.

The Chinese proposal, hitherto secret, is embraced in groups of articles, the first article of Group I, relating to the above stated agreement regarding the disposition of German possessions in Shantung and the restoration of Kiaochau.

Article III pledges China to dispose of the territory of Weidow and another power by transfer, lease or otherwise. Under Article IV China, in the event she wished to borrow money to build a railway from Chefoo to Lungkow to connect with the Kiaochau-Tsinan Railway, would apply to Japanese capitalists, provided Germany were willing to abandon her right to the territory.

Article VI contains a provision for the settlement of the rights articles under Group II deal with arrangements in South Manchuria, as follows: Extending to ninety-nine years the lease to Japan of Port Arthur and the railway between the South Manchuria and Antung-Mukden railways, giving Japanese subjects the right to lease land and enjoy all other privileges of residence, travel, industry and commerce in South Manchuria, but obligating them to observe Chinese police laws and regulations and pay Chinese taxes; Japanese to be tried in civil and criminal cases by their own courts until such time as the Chinese judicial system should be reformed.

Health Board Shuts School

Staten Island Building Is Judged Unsanitary

A Board of Health placard adorns the three-story frame structure which housed the Oakwood Heights School at Oakwood Heights, Staten Island. It proclaims that the building is unfit for human occupancy.

The enforced closing of the school followed an inspection of it made February 7 by representatives of the Board of Health and the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. They found it dirty and ill-ventilated, its plumbing out of order and its pupils unkempt.

Children will get plumbing out of order, said Mrs. Duche, yesterday. "I have taught school for forty years and never had a case of sickness or a doctor's bill. Feed children enough and they always will be well."

Allied Envoys Will Attempt to End Lemberg Siege

WARSAW, Feb. 15. (By The Associated Press.)—The peace conference delegation to Poland will send a commission to Lemberg Monday in an endeavor to arrange an armistice with the forces besieging that city.

One of the difficulties to arranging an armistice is that the Ruthenian leaders have little power over their followers. The situation in Lemberg is very bad, with women and boys continuing to fight side by side with a number of exhausted and ill-equipped Polish regulars.

Allied officers who visited the city recently say they witnessed the bringing into hospitals of wounded women. The Ruthenians, it is asserted, do not want to surrender the city, and the Polish regulars are being used to fight against them.

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Naval Bases Prohibited

Group III requires China's assent to joint arrangements between Japan and Han Meh Ping Company. Group IV is a stipulation that China will not transfer or lease to any other power the bays, harbors or islands along the coast of China.

Group V is an engagement by China never to permit a foreign power to construct shipyards, military coaling stations, naval bases or other military establishments on the coast of Fukien Province and not to attempt to build such herself with foreign capital.
