Industrial Cotton
There was a renewal of the forward movement in cotton futures yesterday. The market started irregularly, but soon turned strong on active general buying. A factor in this buying was re-purchasing by speculators who had taken profits and had been temporarily out of the market, but there also was continued buying by Southern interests, and this was taken to indicate that actual cotton for sale in the South was being rapidly absorbed. Around midday offerings increased and the market fell back 15 to 25 points. A strong period of maintenance in the afternoon prices turned upward again, and in the late hour broad buying resulted in a closing which showed net gains of 30 to 60 points for the day.

Wheat—Advices from Montreal say that the Wheat Export Company of Canada has arranged to purchase 4,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat for export during the next four or five months. As the total visible supply of wheat in Canada is 42,742,000 bushels, this quantity of flour will use an amount of 20,371,000 bushels of wheat. It is reported that the Australian market is making only fair progress, it is reported. Farmers there are said to be dissatisfied with the government's policy of raising the price of wheat to 100 cents per bushel. Receipts at New York were 74,000 bushels.

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Titled American Millionaire Taxed More Than Income

Man Believed To Be Viscount Astor Pays Heavy Impost in the United States
LONDON, April 9 (Correspondence of The Associated Press).—That a man should pay more money for income tax than the total of his income seems the limit of taxation. This is said to be the plight of a well-known British peer who was born an American and became naturalized in England some years ago. His property is in the United States. Being a British subject, he is compelled by British law to pay income tax on all his revenues from all sources, and the American law compels payment of income tax on all his income from American property. Being a multi-millionaire, his income is subject to heavy surtaxes by both governments, and the two taxes are said to amount to more than 100 per cent of the income.

Thus the unfortunate nobleman must pay out all of his receipts and dip into his capital to defray current taxes, and after defraying this first charge, use more of the capital for living expenses. The double income tax of the war period has hit hard well-to-do Americans who live in Great Britain. In American business men living in Britain gave up their American citizenship. But many of them have found this draft on their patriotism too heavy and have recently changed their allegiance and taken out naturalization papers.

As for those Americans who lived in the United States, they found the social atmosphere of England more congenial, and the scope for spending money and pleasures greater than at home, most of them seem to have disappeared. Viscount Astor, formerly Viscount Waldorf Astor, the American millionaire expatriate, who has lived in England for years, owns more realty in New York City than perhaps any other American.

Viscount Astor's income from his father's estate here is estimated at \$4,000,000 annually. New York state and city taxes on this share are fixed at about \$1,500,000, United States income and surtaxes at \$1,500,000, and the British income tax at \$1,000,000, a total of about \$4,000,000 a year, a larger sum than the viscount's income. In addition to his share of the estate, Viscount Astor owns separately many pieces of property in New York City, the income from which is subject to the same double taxation.

U. S. Legion Delegates To Be Elected April 26
General O'Ryan Calls Upon New York Veterans to Help in Elections
Probably the first order ever issued to the veterans of the great war who are members of the newly formed American Legion was sent out last night by Major General John F. O'Ryan, chairman of the New York State Committee of the Legion.

General O'Ryan calls upon the New York State veterans to assemble in the armories on April 26 and elect delegates to the caucus which will be held May 8-10. He also announced the personnel of the state district committees. At least 60 per cent of the delegates to the caucus must be enlisted men. Representation is based on the number of Representatives each state sends to Washington. The state will have eighty-six delegates and the same number of alternates. New York City will send twenty-two; Long Island sixteen; Middle New York eight and Northern and Western twelve each.

Senator Says People Will Force Rails to Give Service
ST. LOUIS, April 17.—Prophecy that if waterways and railroad agencies do not cooperate to the fullest extent in providing transportation for the nation, they will be compelled to do so by "the mandate of the people" was made by United States Senator Selden P. Spencer, of Missouri, in opening the two-day convention of the Mississippi Valley Waterways Association here today. Senator Spencer said steps must be taken to prevent unfair competition between railroads and water transportation systems to the ultimate loss of the consumer.

Cowboys Who Hoped To Follow T. R. Return Two New York Architects Also Among Soldiers Brought Back by Sierra
One hundred and twenty-five cowboys from Mexico, who enrolled two years ago in the division which the late Colonel Roosevelt hoped to take to France, returned from France yesterday on the Sierra. They were the officers and enlisted men of the 40th Division's military police and had been overseas since August 4, 1917. Fifteen German spies were unmasked and captured by them.
