

**Roosevelt Church Plan Launched at Impressive Service**

**Memorial Structure To Be Built on Long Island Is Discussed by Relatives and Friends of Colonel**

The inaugural meeting of the Roosevelt Church, to be erected somewhere on Long Island as a memorial to America's military representatives in the World War, was the occasion of an impressive ceremony yesterday afternoon at the Collegiate Church of St. Nicholas, Fifth Avenue and Forty-eighth Street, where the late Colonel Roosevelt's father worshipped.

The Rev. Edward Lawrence Hunt, minister of the Roosevelt Church, directed the services, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Malcolm James MacLeod. Miss Julia Arthur recited "The Flag," "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" and a poem, "Theodore Roosevelt." Mrs. Marie Narell, who sang for Colonel Roosevelt in the White House, sang "There is No Death" and "A Mother's Prayer." Brief addresses were made by Assemblyman Theodore Roosevelt, Mrs. Douglas Robinson, sister of the late President and Lawrence Abbott, of the Outlook. Lawrence Hunt, fourteen years old, to whom Colonel Roosevelt gave a bullet which killed an elephant in Africa, read portions of an address Colonel Roosevelt made to men of the army and navy shortly before American troops began going to France.

**Church To Be Interdenominational**  
The Roosevelt Church, with the consent of the Roosevelt family, has been incorporated under the laws of New York. It will be interdenominational, with emphasis on what all churches hold in common. A member of any other church, therefore, may become a member of the Roosevelt Church without withdrawing from the other church. The Hunt declared the church will be built in a suburb somewhere on Long Island, where there is no church now, and not at Forest Hills, as has been reported. If sufficient members are secured a similar church will be erected in Washington, D. C., with membership open to both residents and non-residents.

In keeping with its aims, the church will have as speakers some of the foremost preachers of the world. Their sermons will be printed and sent to all non-resident members. Persons contributing \$100 or more to the church in 1920 will be considered among its founders. Others joining during this year will be enrolled as charter members and charter subscribers.

The Hunt said yesterday of how he saw the late Colonel Roosevelt at the White House and quoted a passage from the Bible which he considered both a fact and prophecy that morning. "Thou hast loved righteousness and hated wickedness; therefore God, even our God, hath anointed thee with the oil of gladness even above all others." As the Colonel left the room Dr. Hunt said he turned and said: "I will be a better man because of what you have said."

**Describes Father's Views**  
Assemblyman Theodore Roosevelt spoke in favor of the plan for the church, urging that those interested in the project translate their feelings into action.

"Father was fond of that old maxim 'Practice what you preach,'" he said. "He always told us no amount of high thinking would amount to anything unless put into action. He did not believe in the kind of religion that you put in cotton wool on week days, or going to church for a mental massage of righteous feelings."

Lawrence Abbott denied the accusation that Colonel Roosevelt was "ambitious." He had an "overmastering ambition for service and not for himself," Mr. Abbott declared. He also quoted the Colonel as saying that the King of Italy was "the kind of man who would carry his own precinct," and that "a king is often a cross between a vice-president and a leader of the 400."

Mrs. Robinson's reminiscences of her brother moved the audience both to laughter and tears. She recited a poem, "Sagamore," written on the day the Colonel died after a squadron of airplanes from the field where Quentin Roosevelt trained soared over Sagamore Hill out of respect to the Colonel's memory.

**Woman Plunges to Death From 11th Floor Window**

**Husband Is Leaning From Sill Watching Crowd When Identity of Victim Is Phoned to Him**

Cries and shrieks from the street caused William Gubiller to open a window of his apartment on the eleventh floor of 790 Riverside Drive last night and look out. He saw several persons, among them a patrolman, clustered around the body of a woman that lay on the sidewalk beneath the window.

A moment later his telephone rang and the superintendent of the house informed him that his wife, Marie, twenty-two years old, was the woman on the sidewalk.

Persons passing the house saw the woman poised for an instant on the sill of a window. She pitched forward and struck the sidewalk close to Pastime, Laundry of the West 122d Street Police Station. She was killed outright. The police recorded the case as a suicide.

Her husband said he knew of no reason for her to take her life. She had been talking to him a few minutes before he heard the shrieks outside, he said, and then had gone into another room.

**Women Jurors Discussed Anti-Suffragist Says Duty Would Be Irksome**

The question of jury service for women was discussed last night at a meeting of the Association of Grand Jurors at the Hotel Astor.

Mary G. Kilbrieth, president of the National Association Opposed to Women Suffrage, said that women were more interested in taking care of their homes than in public affairs, and jury service would prove irksome to them as soon as the novelty wore off.

Rose Rothenberg, Assistant District Attorney, said that the jury system needed women to make it more humane.

Alfred J. Talley, another Assistant District Attorney, declared that women's domestic duties were much more important to the state than their service on juries. Robert Adamson spoke in favor of feminine jurors.

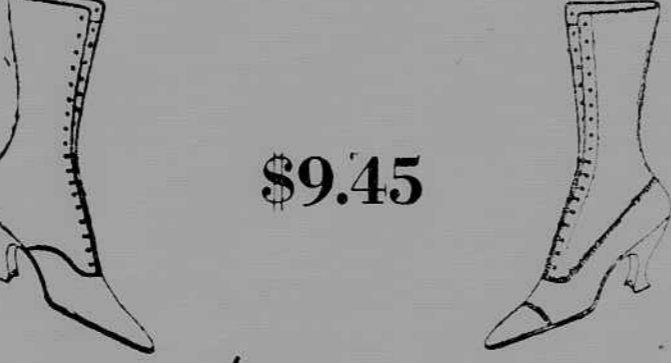

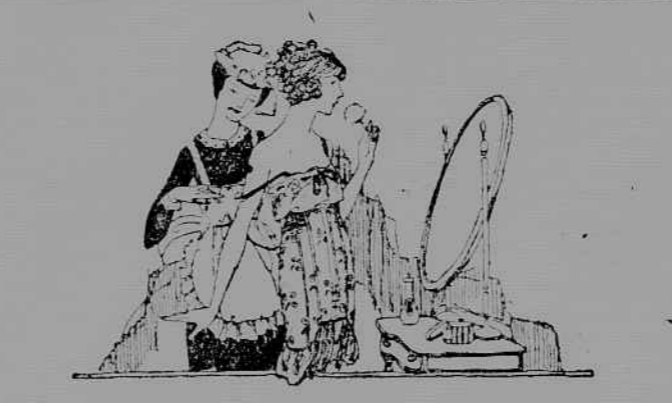
