TRADING IS TOLD OF NEGLECT

Have a record of never joining in a "sympathetic strike," was fully summed up in their joint telegram to the White House.

Fear For Own Safety.

"The plain intention of the railroad executives to smash the shopcraft unions in order to reduce the cost of the locomotives and equipment getting into disrepair and the dangers of a most hazardous occupation are being daily increased.

Allied Unions Asked to Donate "War Chest" to Aid Striking Shopmen

Organized labor, mobilizing for what easily may be its greatest struggle, today began the massing of a huge "war chest" to support the railroad shopcrafts in their nationwide strike.

Asks Day's Pay.

Labor's "war chest," it was learned, was launched with an appeal to \$5,000 members of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers to donate one full day's pay in support of the striking shopmen.

Men Charge Coercion.

"Coercion is being used in some cases to get brotherhood men to do the work of strikebreakers," Clark continued. "Conditions are deplorable, and if the rail executives brand these charges as ridiculous, my only answer is that they themselves will look ridiculous within a few days."

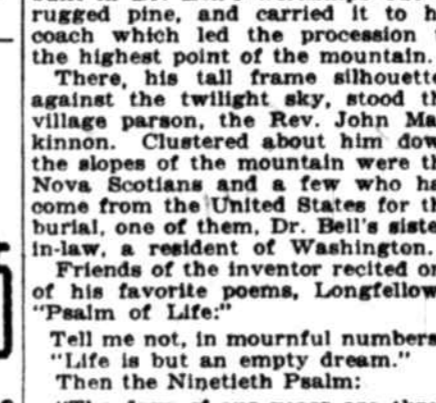
