

THE BURROUGHS HOMICIDE. THE TRIAL ENDED.

A VERDICT OF ACQUITTAL. Popular Excitement and Sympathy.

WRANGLING OF COUNSEL. DISGRACEFUL SCENES IN COURT.

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, July 19, 1865. The verdict of acquittal in the case of Miss Harris is exciting considerable discussion here, and while the plea of insanity is almost universally considered invalid, the popular verdict coincides with that of the jury in her case.
