THOMPSON TO "BOMB" FORD.

Aviator, After "Attacking" Chicago, Will "Bomb" Boston and Detroit.

Chicago, April 25.—Chicago having been given its taste of the fruits of unpreparedness by Delloyd Thompson, who last night, from an airplane, bombarded buildings in the downtown section of the city, the aviator today packed up and started for Boston, the next point of attack. After that city has been theoretically reduced, Detroit is to be visited.

"When I get to Detroit, I expect to drop bombs on the home of Henry Ford, apostle of pacifism, and show him how easy it would be to attack an unprepared city," said Thompson today.

G. U. DEBATE TONIGHT.

Seniors Will Clash With Juniors Over Literacy Test.

The literacy test in immigration legislation will be debated tonight by the Senior and Junior Debating Societies of Georgetown University Law School in the last of a series of four prize debates. Senior debaters will uphold the affirmative. The judges will be Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana; Senator James A. O'Gorman, of New York; Charles H. Robb, Associate Justice, District Court of Appeals; Frank Lyon Polk, Counselor of the State Department, and Charles Warren, Assistant Attorney General. The debate, open to the public, will commence at 7:30 o'clock in the auditorium of the school at Fifth and E streets northwest.

The senior representatives will be Granville Wyche, of South Carolina, and John Thomas Hatfield, of Washington. The junior debaters will be Basil Thomas Bonnot, of Wisconsin, and Edward Thomas Hogan, of Rhode Island.
