### ROCHE DENIES BET

Emphatic Testimony in Hand Book Case.

### SLIPS SHOWN IN COURT

Alleged Handbook Maker Put Under Grilling Cross-examination by the Prosecution—Request of Defense that Jury Deal Carefully with Jubb's Testimony is Granted.

Philip J. Roche, charged with making a handbook, was kept on the stand for more than an hour yesterday afternoon in the Police Court under a fire of questions from Assistant District Attorney Ralph Given regarding his former testimony as to his acquaintance with Jubb and the alleged placing of a bet on July 16.

Roche claimed he had not known Jubb previous to July 12, when he came into his saloon, ostensibly for the purpose of selling some jewelry. He denied emphatically that Jubb had made any bets with him previous to July 16, and claimed the piece of paper which Detective Hoover and Cox found him examining had been left by Jubb on the bar, and that it was merely his curiosity which led him to pick it up and look at it.

### Shown Seized Slips.

Mr. Given showed the witness the slips which are alleged to have been found in Roche's coat pockets and behind the bar. The defendant disclaimed all knowledge of them. On one of the slips was written "The Hazard to win, J. C. J." the latter being Jubb's initials.

The defense placed two witnesses on the stand in an effort to disprove Jubb's assertion that he was with Roche about noon July 16. Both admitted they might have been mistaken as to the exact time of day, at which time they were with Roche took place.

Wilton J. Lambert, counsel for the defense, requested the court to instruct the jury to deal with Jubb's testimony with caution, in case they found that he had been paid to procure testimony. This was granted.

After arguments by Mr. Given and Leo P. Harlow and Charles E. Baum, the court adjourned until 1 o'clock this afternoon. It is expected a verdict will be returned to-day.

Among the interested spectators at the trial yesterday was Louis J. Kennedy, secretary of what is commonly known as the "Senatorial Third Degree Committee."

### ENGAGED TO HURD, MRS. CRAMER'S PLEA

Denies She Used "Spirit" to Procure \$36,000.

Mrs. Laura Cramer, against whom suit has been instituted for the return of \$36,000 which she is alleged to have obtained from Fenton J. Hurd, by "spirit" communications from his deceased wife, yesterday advanced the defense before Justice Gould that she was engaged to be married to Hurd.

Mrs. Cramer does not deny having received the money, but she denies that spiritualism had anything to do with it. She produced a tender little missive which she received from Hurd in December, 1904, in which he refers to their engagement. He signed himself "Fente," which Mrs. Cramer said was the name Hurd adopted in his correspondence with her.

It was admitted by Mrs. Cramer that she wrote two "pook" letters, just to satisfy a whim of her fiance. Hurd declared his wife wrote him about 100 letters, representing them to be "spirit" messages, asking him to take care of Mrs. Cramer, and supply her with all the money she needed.

Hurd, according to the defense of Mrs. Cramer, at one time made the threat to give away his property for the purpose of depriving his children thereof, and that he gave \$12,000 to a woman to whom he was formerly engaged.

The suit against Mrs. Cramer is brought by Dr. Lee M. Hurd, of Greenbelt, Conn., a conservator of his grandfather's estate. The jurisdiction of the court was denied in yesterday's arguments by Mrs. Cramer's attorney, Justice Gould, and continue the hearing to-day and afford Hurd's counsel an opportunity to reply.

### WRITES FOR DUNCAN McRAE.

#### Services in Charge of Theta Delta Chi Fraternity.

Nearly 100 members of the Theta Delta Chi fraternity gathered at the home of Duncan McRae yesterday afternoon, to pay their last respects. The body of McRae, who was drowned in the Potomac River near Sycamore Island, while canoeing last Saturday afternoon, lay in a casket, banked with flowers in the chapel of J. Williams Lee's undertaking establishment yesterday afternoon, and at 5 o'clock the members of the fraternity gathered to participate in the last rites for the dead. At a signal the group filed into the chapel and took seats near the bier. Then Rev. T. E. Lewis and Rev. J. Macbride Sterrett passed up the aisle chanting the Episcopal funeral ritual. It consisted of responsive services and a prayer by Dr. Lewis.

When the church ritual was over, the fraternity rose in a body and chanted their death song, a farewell with a promise of future union.

Maj. James A. McRae, U. S. A., young McRae's uncle, and his wife were present. The body will be sent to Macon, Ga.
