Gen. Dugan was in the regular army previous to the war of the rebellion, and served throughout the contest in the Union army, and was prominently connected with the Grand Army of the Republic, and was at one time special examiner for the Pension Bureau.

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LET FRANCE SEND THEM

Is the Advice Given Germans in Regard to Russian Loans. DE WITTE VISITS BERLIN.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The prolonged stay in Berlin of M. de Witte, the Russian minister of finance, simultaneously with the visit to the German capital of an agent of the Bank of St. Petersburg, has given the appearance of an attempt to report that Russia is endeavoring to induce Germany to participate in politico-financial projects in China.

NOT A SAFE FINANCER. The Cologne Gazette, apropos of the reports that several Berlin bankers had been sounding Minister de Witte in the question of guaranteeing a share in a new Russian state loan, warns them to keep aloof from all financial projects in which Mr. de Witte is concerned, and pursuing the subject, reminds them that since he had obtained evidence of the loan, the debt of that empire had been increased by three and a half milliards of francs.

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
