Its Attorneys Save Mrs. Kane from a Shylock's Clutches.

TEST CASE AGAINST NEWMAN

Jury Renders a Verdict of \$229.50 for the Victim of a Usurious Money-Lender—Served Given an Oppressed Woman by a Fearless Newspaper. No Appeal Yet Taken.

The Times does not often refer to the fact that, by the aid of the publicity it commands, many abuses have been corrected through its columns and by its outside efforts. This morning, however, it becomes a duty and a pleasure to announce that the Times' Free Bureau of legal advice yesterday restored to Mrs. Kane, without cost to her, the household goods which had been unlawfully seized by Money-Lender Newman, through his skillful practice of what is known as shylockism.

Some months ago the Times commenced a war of extermination on the pirates of the poor. It has indulged in no self-laudation of its course in connection with the interests of the common people, for the fight has been kept up and has been won. The Times is a newspaper, but it is also a public servant and feels a real debt to the people who have, in less than two years, made the most popular and largely circulated newspaper in Washington.

The case of Mrs. Sarah V. Kane against Shylock Myer B. Newman was decided by a jury before Judge Cole yesterday in fifteen minutes in favor of the plaintiff.
