## NEWS WAS UNMOVED

### Never Flinched When the Judge Pronounced Sentence.

#### VERDICT APPROVED BY ALL

Three of the Jury First Stood Out for Imprisonment, But Were Finally Brought to Change Their Views. Quickest Trial and Conviction on Record in Alexandria County.

The sentence of death pronounced upon the negro boy, Albert Hawkins, who attempted to assault little Saule Sherrer in Alexandria, Virginia, last in the Alexandria county court, yesterday, by Judge H. C. Spitzer, drew with the approval of every one. It is regarded as a just sentence for a heinous crime, and one that will strike terror into the hearts of all eye-witnesses for the future.

The people of Alexandria county are congratulating themselves that they allowed the law to take its course, instead of taking into their own hands the law. They know the wrong done the young girl will meet with adequate punishment. In Alexandria the trial and sentence are the sole business of conversation.

The trial is the quietest that has ever taken place in any court in Alexandria city or county, where the law's devoirs are very numerous and are taken advantage of on the slightest pretext.

**QUICK WORK.**

But in this case the criminal was arraigned, positively identified by his victims and within forty-eight hours after the crime had been committed, as in the "runners' row" of the city, the case was ready for trial on the 21st day of December, when he was hanged.

Twelve of the jury, who were the leading citizens of the county, men who could give the prisoner at the bar a fair and impartial trial, after hearing the evidence they returned to their rooms and began discussing their verdict. They agreed upon the death sentence, but carried over their deliberations to the 22nd day of the month.

The laws of Virginia make it optional with the jury to impose a sentence of death or to confine the prisoner in the State penitentiary for a term of not less than three, or more than eighteen years. Nine of the jurors, on the first ballot, favored the extreme penalty of the law, and the other three voted for imprisonment. An hour was spent in discussing the matter, but the three were not over-ruled, and the sentence imposed.

Judge Spitzer, in pronouncing sentence upon the negro, said that he was satisfied that the law had been properly applied, and that the three who voted for imprisonment were in the wrong. He said that he had never known a case where the jury was so divided, and that he had never known a case where the jury was so divided.

Hawkins, when told to stand, said that if he had anything to say why he should not be pronounced upon him, he would say a perfectly good word, nothing. He was, by far, the least distressed person in the courtroom, and his face never changed in expression when the judge delivered his sentence.

**PASSING THE SENTENCE.**

"You have been given a fair and impartial trial by a jury of your peers, and the jury has fixed your punishment at death. The sentence of the court, therefore, is that you shall be taken back to the county jail and kept in close confinement until the 31st day of December, when you shall be hanged by the neck until dead, dead, dead."

The sheriff was then directed to take charge of the prisoner, and he was taken from the courtroom to the county jail by Mr. Davis, who was appointed by the court to defend the prisoner, and for a general appearance in the case. Mr. Davis noted no exceptions to the judge's ruling, so that Hawkins can have no hope of life through the courts.

While the jury was out, and it looked as if the full penalty of the law would be heard all over the courtroom, from the benches to the gallery, when the lawyers of the case were called in to discuss the case, and there it hardly any doubt but that these threats would have been made good had not the sentence of death been pronounced.

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The secretary read the report of the treasurer and of the board of directors, also that of Mr. Henry Ermold, the superintendent of the asylum.

The report of the secretary touched on the recent trouble at the asylum, in which Mr. Ermold was alleged to be involved, but without making any comment, except to say that after a careful investigation by Col. John Taylor, Major-General of the army, and Mr. Wilson, agent of the Humane Society, the charges against Mr. Ermold were not sustained.

Mr. Ermold's report dealt with the management of the institution for the past year, and was accepted and approved.
