CELEBRATED BY A BANQUET

TRUCK FARMERS WILL WAIT. Additional Testimony to Be Submitted by Them.

The meeting of the truck farmers of the District and the neighboring counties of Maryland and Virginia and the retail produce-dealers occupying space on Eastern street between Seventh and Ninth streets north west, scheduled to have been held yesterday at 2 p. m. at Market Hall, did not materialize.

SMALLPOX HOSPITAL. This cannot be done for two or three months, possibly will not be done for a year.
