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CHANDLER TO CLEVELAND

He Writes a Caustic Letter on the Railroad Pool.

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Both Sides to Be Heard on the Bond Bill Question.

Some Further Considerations For Those Who Will Participate in the Friendly Fight—Where the Prejudices Will Be Rules For the Content and Qualifications of Voters.

There will be one more week for reflection for those who will avail themselves of the opportunity of voting on the bond bill in the Times ballot boxes. These will be placed this morning at thirty-five precincts within the limits of the city proper and will be reminders of the proposed vote until next Monday morning when the voting will begin.

VOTING BEGINS NEXT WEEK

The voters of the District will be advised specifically in due time of what will constitute a qualified voter, and also on the points which his vote, yes or no, will affect. The vote is taken to find the preponderance of sentiment in general terms on the questions: Do you think that the District should be bonded to pay for the system of sewerage and for street extension and improvements?

WHAT YOU VOTE FOR.

The most rabid supporter of the bond bill will have the same advantage as the most violent opponent of the bill as to the issues above stated. If the bill passes with the bond issue at \$1,500,000 the total annual interest will be at 3 per cent, \$225,000 and it will be well to remember that the Congressional committee are not agreed as to whether the amount should, or should not, pay half of this annual interest.

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KILLING CUBAN PRISONERS

Spaniards Give an Exhousé That They Tried to Escape.

Government Building Forts and Towers of Defence—Rebels Under Pancho Sanchez Enter Sango.

Santiago de Cuba, Nov. 16, via Key West, Fla., Nov. 24.—On November 12 Gen. Canellas and Col. Segura had an engagement with the rebel leaders, Periquito Perez and Bonno, in La Gloria, in the Guanatanamo district. Both sides had only small bands of men.

The fight lasted about half an hour, and the Spaniards had two killed and four wounded. The rebels lost two wounded. Gen. Canellas afterwards visited Macabeo, Cuero, Hatibonico, Morrillo and Playa Boracha, all these places being in the Guanatanamo district. He asserts that he has not seen any signs to prove that the Cuban leader, Carrillo, has landed in that neighborhood, as reported.

On November 13 the steamer Villaverde arrived at this port from Manzanillo, and sailed the same day for that city with another regular aboard to assist Gen. Gonzalez Munoz.

The Spaniards have resumed their old practice of killing Cuban prisoners, giving as a pretext the fact that they are being held in the hands of the rebels. Within the last few days they have murdered four or five such unfortunate in the San Luis jurisdiction. They have also killed thirty-four Spaniards, a large barracks, a hospital, and thirteen towers of defense in the districts of Daiquiri, Vinales, and Juraguá.

On November 14 a party of rebels under Col. Pancho Sanchez, approached the Sango railroad station, and after firing on the forts, succeeded in entering the village and killing a number of the wounded. Many men of the village followed Sanchez's party.

More Troops For Cuba.

Barcelona, Nov. 24.—Four thousand eight hundred troops, mostly new recruits, embarked here today on the steamer Colon and Santiago for Cuba. They were given an enthusiastic farewell. The men were in excellent spirits.

Perico Delgado Killed.

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PERISHED IN HIS BED.

Sick Man Killed in a Hotel Fire in North Stratford.

North Stratford, N. H., Nov. 24.—Fire broke out in the Willard House at 6:30 to-night and spread with rapidity, destroying the building, including the Willard House and heavy stable, the Twoply Block, and several dwellings.

Joseph Kelley, who was sick in bed at the Willard Hotel, perished in the flames. Several persons were badly burned in trying to effect their escape.

The fire was caused by the explosion of a gas lamp, the former furnishing insurance \$35,000, partially covered by insurance.

PASTOR SMITH RESIGNS.

He Expresses His Thanks for the Congregation's Kindness.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 24.—Rev. Frank Hyatt Smith today resigned as pastor of the North Avenue Congregational Church. Mr. Smith was recently before a United States court, charged with sending fraudulent postal cards through the mails and was discharged, after being pronounced insane, by the court.

His letter stated that he wished to be permitted to take effect at the end of this month. It had only words of commendation for his parish. He said he was glad to leave the church, thanked the members for many kindnesses extended to him, and said he was honored, it being the anniversary of their deaths.

MAHER AND MURPHY.

Port Richmond Mills Burned.

New York, Nov. 24.—The large elevator and mills of the elevator and mill company at Port Richmond, Staten Island, owned by Quilman, Travis & Co., were totally destroyed by fire tonight. The cause of the fire was an explosion in the rear of the buildings, thought to have been caused by spontaneous combustion. The loss is estimated at \$25,000, partially covered by insurance.

TURKS MAKE NO ATTEMPT TO RESTORE ARMENIAN PROPERTY.

American College at Marsovan is Now Carefully Protected—Broad Supply of Five Thousand Persons Will Be Cut Off—Outrages on Inhabitants of Schikhan Reported.
