THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE.—The Commissioner of the General Land Office is in receipt of a communication from the Surveyor General of New Mexico and Arizona at Santa Fe, New Mexico, under date of the 17th ult., reporting that on the 15th of December last he entered into a contract with the deputy surveyor for the establishment of the base principal meridian, standard parallel and exterior township lines.

THE QUARTERS POLICE REPORTS.—The quarterly police reports of the Third, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth and Tenth precincts respectively, forwarded to Superintendent Richards yesterday, show the total number of arrests for offenses for the three months ending with the close of the year, within the precincts mentioned, to have been 210,000.

ANOTHER MAN IN THE CANAL.—A man, who by papers found in his person, was identified as CHARLES H. BROWN, of the city of New York, was arrested yesterday at the intersection of the canal and the street south and First street west, on the afternoon of New Year, by Mr. Daniel Sweeney, who, with the assistance of several other persons, rescued him from the hands of a man named BROWN, who, in a fit of rage, had seized the man by the neck of his coat and was endeavoring to throw him into the canal.

A CARE FOR THE BENEVOLENT.—We were yesterday informed that a woman, with several small children, was found recently in a room near South street and Virginia avenue, in a state of the greatest destitution, the whole family being on the verge of actual death from cold and starvation. Our benevolent readers are invited to contribute to the relief of this suffering family, and to the relief of other similar cases.

THE UNITED STATES TREASURER ROBERT ON NEW YEAR'S DAY.—Gen. F. E. Spinner, known to the majority of the "Watch-dog" of the Treasury, while he may be successful in keeping his name and ward over the public purse, is not so successful in the President's reception on New Year's Day to present his own private party from the onslaught of a faithful pickpocket, who, in the presence of the crowd, managed to slip a pocket-book, containing between \$70 and \$80, besides a pair of sleeve-buttons and papers of considerable value.

THE GREAT FALLS GOLD REGION.—Another company has been organized by Mr. Gov. Curtis, of Pennsylvania, to explore the copper and iron fields of the Allegheny region, in the neighborhood of Great Falls, Pa. The company is the Pennsylvania Copper and Iron Company, and is organized as a corporation, with a capital of \$1,000,000.

CONGRESS MONEY.—The Commissioner of Internal Revenue yesterday received the following letter, accompanied by \$200: Philadelphia, Dec. 31, 1896. N. A. Bellows. Enclosed find \$200 for excise tax on goods made and sold which were supposed not to be liable when sold, but have since been found to be liable when sold. I send it to you because, I am told, if I send it in statement here, I will be subjected to penalties, etc. I would break up my business, which, I think, would be unjust, as I have strictly paid the tax on goods that were known to be liable. The above amount is more than the net profit I have made on said goods; and though I do not desire to withhold anything due the Government, I feel that in paying this sum I am doing my full duty.

LOCAL NEWS

SEVERAL CUTTING AFRAY BETWEEN TWO DEPARTMENT CLERKS.—On New Year's night two Department clerks, Thomas E. Egan, of the Treasury, and J. A. Ayres, of the Quartermaster's Department, both of whom are top-notch men in the line of their respective departments, and in the course of their perambulations extended their visits to the home of Miss Henrietta Parkhurst, in Fidler's Row, between Thirtieth and Thirtieth and a-half streets, on D Street, after indulging in frequent potshots, they became somewhat rude in their department towards the fair inmates of the house.

A preliminary hearing was held yesterday morning before Justice Morrell, who committed Egan to the cells for a further hearing in the evening. Last night the two clerks, both parties accompanied by their friends, appeared before Justice Morrell, who took the evidence of Dr. Kearby relative to the condition of Ayres, in order to determine the legality of admitting the prisoner to the hospital. The doctor testified that there had been no hemorrhage of the wound since the night of the stabbing, and that the wound was not attended either with tetanus or erysipelas. In his opinion, Ayres was out of danger unless some unforeseen circumstance occurred, and he recommended that the prisoner be released, and that the Justice held the accused to bail in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance at Court.

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THE WEATHER YESTERDAY.—The winter air of yesterday was all day long, with the chilling of slight blizzards, every body seeming desirous of having one more ride before the "beautiful snow" sends its exhalations to the skies which gave it. Every imaginable style of turnout could be seen on the avenue during the day and evening, from the countryman's rude horse made structure, composed of planks, to the elegant four-horse sleigh drawn by grunting steeds glittering with trappings fresh from the manufactory. The cold made on the snow on New Year's rendered locomotion of this kind not quite so desirable as on the previous day.

The snow on the avenue during the forenoon gave place to a crystallization of mist and water, but still the sleighs sped merrily on, and happy pairs spoke language "which was not to be repeated," and as the sleighing disappeared, sought the quiet of the less frequented roads outside the city. In the evening, however, again, a general shower of snow, falling, perhaps, as heavy as that which came out "winking in a crystalline delight," and promising better sleighing and skating at the peak to-morrow.
