

MADMAN HUNT FAILS TO YIELD QUARRY; 3 HELD

Police Convinced Trio Taken Sunday Are Innocent.

500 COMB DISTRICT Two of Women Victims of Attacks Friday Continue in Serious Condition.

Wish every man, woman, and child in Washington on the alert to capture the madman, who Friday morning attacked three women in their homes, the criminal was still uncaptured early this morning, and the trail seemed to those engaged in the hunt to have grown cold.

Two are Baltimoreans. One of the men was a resident of Baltimore whose conduct and inability to explain their presence in the city led the police to believe they might have some knowledge of Friday's mystery.

One stated that they had only been "over to see the movies" and the other that they intended to return immediately. Both are being held for further investigation and word from the Baltimore authorities.

While the police do not believe that he is guilty of this crime, they are looking for an Italian barber, Charles Pucci, 45 years old, who three months ago attempted an assault with a dangerous weapon.

Police authorities last night expressed the opinion that the man must have escaped from the city, and that it is thought he will be through a chink unheeded outside of Washington.

RIVER MYSTERY NEAR SOLUTION

Former Army Surgeon, Wanted for Uxoricide, May Be in Mexico.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 26.—One of the most mysterious crimes in the history of the South is today believed to be near solution in the identification of the body of a young woman found on the bank of the James River, December 20, as that of Mrs. Sue Kathleen Hadley.

She was the talented and attractive wife of Dr. Wilmer Amos Hadley, a former army surgeon, who had disappeared and is now being sought in Texas and other States.

Dr. Hadley received his discharge from the War Department, the interior department here on December 5. The woman's body, when found, was entangled in the roots of a tree on the banks of the James River. When the body was found the glove on the woman's left hand had been partly torn off, indicating, the police believe, that blows were torn from the fingers.

Lithuania Will Abide by League of Nations

Paris, Jan. 26.—Lithuania is willing to place her case in the hands of the league of nations and abide by its decision, President Wilson was informed today in a memorandum submitted to him by the Lithuanian delegation, just arrived here.

EXTRA SESSION TO OPEN MAY 2

Tentative Date Set on Account of Hopeless Jam in Legislation.

May 2 has been tentatively fixed as the date upon which it probably will be necessary for the extra session of Congress to convene. Legislation is in such a hopeless jam that leaders of both parties admit an extra session cannot well be avoided.

Only 32 Days Left. Including today, there are only 32 days left in which to transact all the enormous amount of business on the calendars of the Senate and House, including all the supply bills for the army and navy and every other department of the government.

General deficiency bill, carrying something over \$25,000,000, will be taken up this week. From this statement it will be seen that it would require almost superhuman energy on the part of both houses to finish the business and get through by midnight of March 4.

Seven of the other bills are still in committees of the House, and have to be reported by those committees and passed by the House before reaching the Senate. Army appropriation bill, Pension bill, Sundry Civil appropriation bill and the Fortifications bill.

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FORMER HERALD MAN BACK WITH LAURELS OF CONFLICT

New York, Jan. 26.—Lieut. Thomas R. Darden, formerly a Washington Herald man, was a passenger on the transport Carona, which arrived yesterday. Lieut. Darden, who was awarded the Croix de Guerre, the medal given by King Albert of Belgium, and the "Distinguished Service Cross" given by the British to commemorate the smallest amount of gallantry of whom the American officer was one, had been twice gassed and showered by shrapnel from a "baby trap" the Germans had set.

RUSS TACKLE WORK OF DIVIDING LAND

Also Begin Plans for Restoring Railways and Highways. Adjustment of the land problem in Northern Russia has been undertaken by the Archangel government, an official dispatch to the Russian Embassy yesterday announced. President Tschalikovsky named commissions at various centers to carry out the work of acreage distribution before his recent departure for Paris, it was stated.

DECLARES GERMANY IS EXPIATING CRIME

Maximilian Harden Says Other Nations Will Be Revenged. Berlin, Jan. 26.—"Never will injustice bring happiness," writes Maximilian Harden in the latest issue of his weekly Die Zukunft. "Germany is now expiating for her injustice in an unprecedented manner. If we disappear from earth our plaint will be heard in the place whither human plaint never has risen in vain.

GREAT TEMPLE OF PATRIOTISM ASSURED CITY

Advocates of Memorial Project Expect Congress to Hasten Bill.

COST TO BE \$1,000,000 Conference of Committees of Societies Interested to Be Held Today.

Washington is to have a temple of patriotism unless all present signs fail.

Plans for a magnificent structure as a living monument to the sacrifice and valor of American soldiers and sailors have taken concrete form. A bill covering the project is being prepared by Representative W. Frank James, of Michigan, and will be presented in the House this week. It will carry an appropriation of \$1,000,000 or more.

Conferees will be held today between members of the memorial committee of the President's Own Garrison, Army and Navy Union, and the Fine Arts Commission, Maj. Raymond W. Pullman, Chief of Police, who has fathered the projected structure in the Washington Board of Trade.

Will Petition Congress. Following these conferences and introduction of the bill in Congress, Maj. Commander W. L. Hull, of the President's Own Garrison, will urge all patriotic organizations in the United States to petition House and Senate for passage of the measure.

It is pointed out that the proposed memorial structure will supply several crying needs for Washington. One of these is a great auditorium for the national conventions that are held here from time to time.

LAUDS ITALY'S RECORD IN WAR

Daniels Also Urges All Immigrants to Become American Citizens. Should Become Citizens. The Prussian autocrat, said Mr. Daniels, did not pause to read that Italy's plighted word was confirmed as he entered the war and that to aid in a war of oppression, to be a party to the rape of Belgium, the undoing of France, and cruel warfare against noncombatants and women and children, Italian crimes abhorrent to the spirit of Italy.

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50,000 ATTEND LIEBKNECHT RITE

Procession Four Miles Long Braves Guns to Follow Body to Grave. Berlin, Jan. 26.—A procession four miles long and composed of fully 50,000 persons attended the funeral of Dr. Karl Liebknecht, chief of the German "Reds," and thirty other Spartacists.

GERMANY FEARS "RED" INVASION
