

**Marine Accused By Haytian of Fatal Beating**  
Gendarme Charges Lieut. Williams With Killing a Native by Slugging Him With a Piece of Lumber

Officer Detained in U. S.

Inquiry Delayed While Instructions Are Given From Secretary Daniels

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Hayti, Nov. 20. (By The Associated Press.)—The testimony of Sign Gabet, a native gendarme, charging that Lieutenant Williams of the gendarmarie beat a native to death in January, 1919, caused an expected delay in the proceedings of the naval court of inquiry which is investigating the alleged killing of Haytians by American marines. The witness failed to give Lieutenant Williams' initials, but it was officially explained that he referred to Dorcas Williams, a sergeant of marines, who now is confined at Quantico, Md., awaiting court martial in Washington in connection with charges resulting from the investigation of conditions in Hayti made by Major General John A. Lejeune, chief of the Marine Corps.

The court communicated with Secretary Daniels of the American navy, asking if Williams would be sent here to see his accuser or waive a hearing. The trial of Williams had been postponed to await the result of the naval inquiry here.

Gabet, a stammering boy, testified he was alone in the office of the gendarmarie with Williams when Gornier was killed with a piece of lumber the size of a man's arm. The witness asserted he cried for aid to help in stopping the attack, but was unable to make himself heard. He said he was unable to explain the reason for the killing, except to say that Jean was summoned to the office of the gendarmarie after a battle with handbills.

**Engineers to Name Board to Inquire Into Trade Waste**

Hoover Will Direct Committee That Will Deal With Labor and Try to Solve Many Industrial Problems

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Appointment of a committee to investigate industrial waste was authorized at the first meeting to-day of the executive board of the new American Engineering Council, of which Herbert C. Hoover is yesterday elected president. This committee, selected upon the recommendation of Mr. Hoover, who will direct its activities, will, it is planned, use the agency through which the council will deal with labor, chambers of commerce and other organizations in the solution of problems of industrial nations.

The board endorsed the movement to organize the Department of the Interior by the establishment of a national department of public works. After a long discussion, in which J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Philip N. Moore, of St. Louis, chairman of the Federal Minerals Commission, strongly advocated departmental reorganization in the Federal government, it was voted to continue the association's activity to bring about this plan.

In principle of the public works movement, the speakers said, had been written into the constitution of the nation, and was bound eventually to be enacted into law. It was hoped that such a law might be taken at the next session. Patent legislation, as another subject discussed at length by the board, formal organization of which was proposed, and Albert T. Denney, of New York, and William H. Butler, of St. Louis, were named vice-chairmen of the council, through which the Federated Engineers' Association will function. Washington was selected as temporary headquarters.

**Rail Fare Inequalities Doomed, Says Paulding**

New York City Official Asserts L. C. C. Decision Will Insure Justice in Intrastate Rates

Charles G. Paulding, assistant vice-president in the law department of the New York Central Lines, in the law department, yesterday issued a statement in which he said the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission ordering railroads in this State to increase their intrastate passenger rates by 20 per cent was of great importance.

The commission authorized this increase in order to bring the intrastate fares in line with the interstate fares authorized by it in the adjusted rate case.

Mr. Paulding said that the financial trouble to the railroads of New York of this decision would be an increase in their passenger revenue of about 20 per cent. All fares are to be raised except commutation fares and as to those the commission has reserved the right.

"The decision," he said, "is a long step in the rehabilitation of the railroads following Federal control."

According to Mr. Paulding, the decision is in favor of persons traveling in interstate commerce as opposed to those traveling in intrastate commerce. It also ends, he said, the discrimination between those who travel outside the State and those who do not.

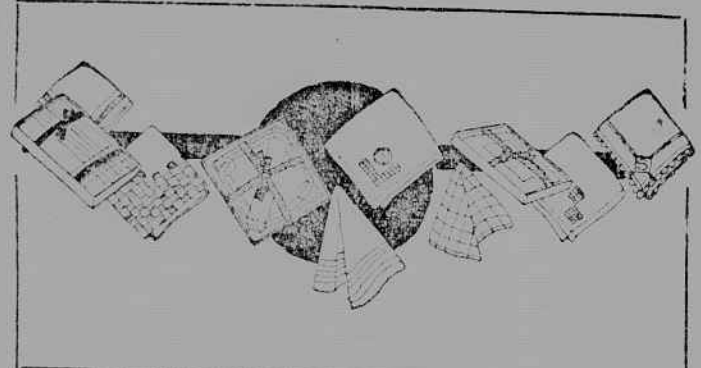

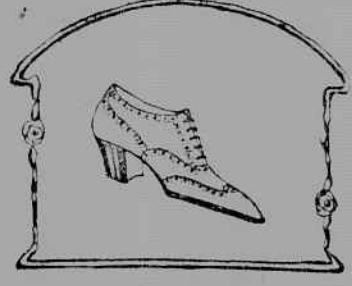

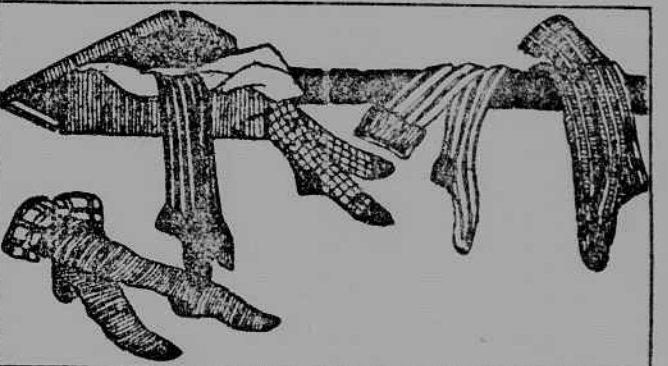
