

**RETURNS CONFIRM  
VOTE OF TUESDAY**

Prince George County Democrat  
Carries Every District—One  
Record Vote.

HYATTSVILLE, Md., Nov. 7.—The board of election supervisors of Prince George county met in Upper Marlboro yesterday and canvassed the votes cast at Tuesday's election. The official count showed practically no difference from the unofficial figures.

Caleb C. Magruder, a native of the county and Democratic candidate for re-election as clerk of the court of appeals of Maryland, carried every district in the county, and secured 1,568 more votes than his nearest opponent. Blair Lee secured a majority of 789 votes over Thomas Parran, his Republican opponent for the United States Senate.

T. Van Clagett, of Upper Marlboro, Democratic candidate for the house of delegates, led the ticket, securing a total of 2,550 votes, twenty-five more than was cast for Blair Lee.

William Randolph Smith, candidate for the house of delegates, led the Republican side of the ticket, securing 1,935 votes, coming within 193 votes of beating out Joseph Blandford, Jr., Democrat, for the honor of representing this county in the lower house of the state legislature.

Addison, Democrat, polled the second highest vote for house of delegates. One of the largest majorities ever registered on the county ticket was that of George P. Hickey, Democratic candidate for the office of register of wills, defeating his Republican opponent, Claude McKee, by 1,450 votes.

The official figures as given out at Upper Marlboro last evening were as follows: For United States Senate, Fields, 4,5; Hendrickson, 2; Lee, 2,563; Parran, 1,783; Wellington, 2. For comptroller of the state treasury, Beckman, 47; Baldwin, 4; Harrington, 1,332; Metzgerott, 1,717. For clerk to the state court of appeals, Denhard, 789; Eldridge, 31; Magruder, 2,385; Saunders, 1,568.

For road director, First road district, Bowley, 85; Smith, 1,858. Second road district, Brady, Democrat, unopposed, 1,851. Third road district, Owens, 982; Randall, 1,727. Fourth road district, Daley, 1,149; Eason, 1,821. For state senate, Carmody, 1,996; Holmead, 2,384; Blandford, 2,191; Clagett, 2,550; Van Clagett, 2,550; Hughes, 1,653; Porter, 1,467; Smallwood, 1,998. For county commissioners, Crandall, 1,289; Gude, 2,127; Pyles, 1,254; Suit, 2,167. For sheriff, Hardy, 2,450; Sweeney, 1,788. For register of wills, Hickey, 2,322; McKee, 1,270. For county surveyor, Latimer, Democrat, unopposed, 2,197.

All the constitutional amendments were carried by small majorities, and but few people voted for them.

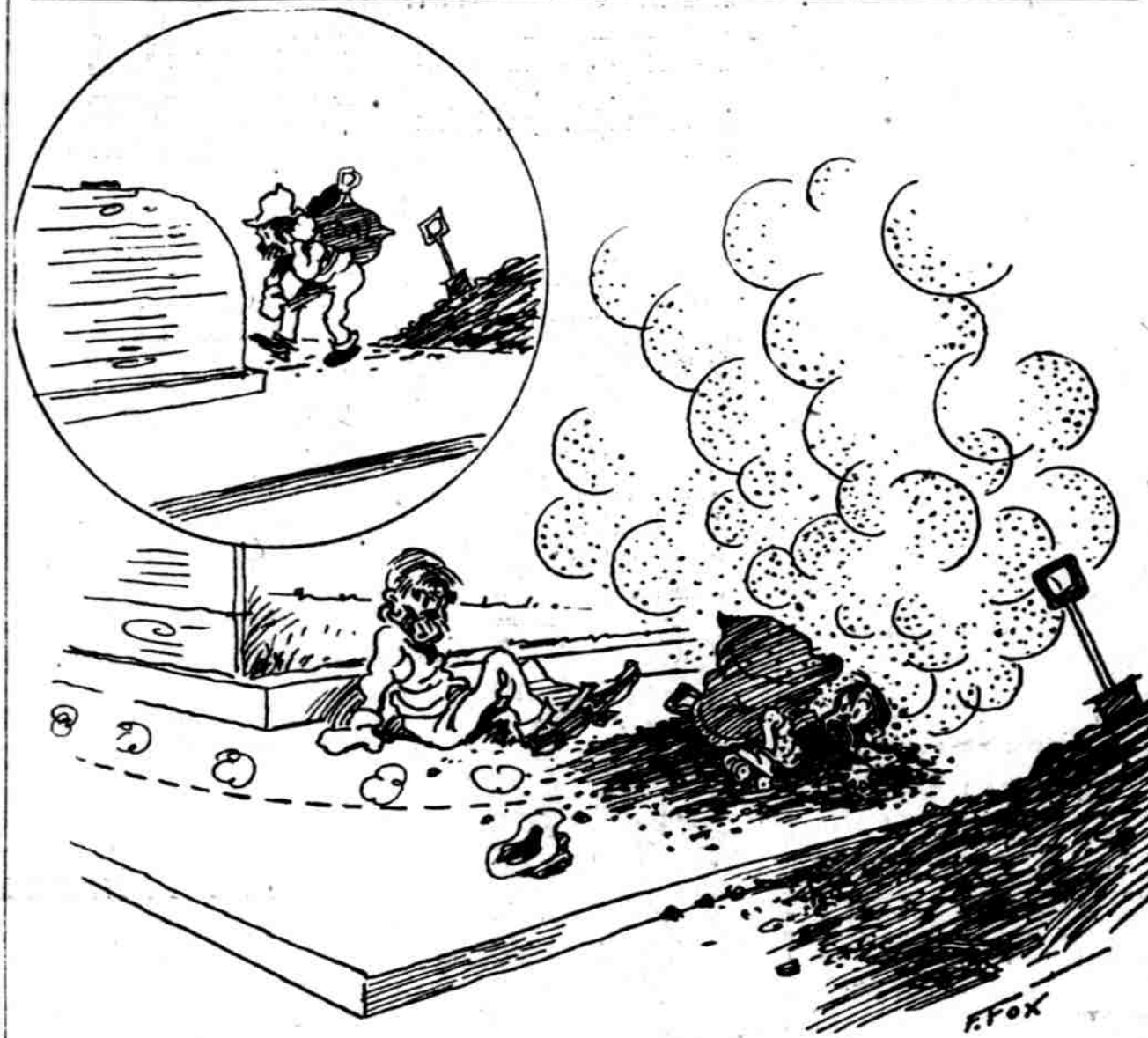

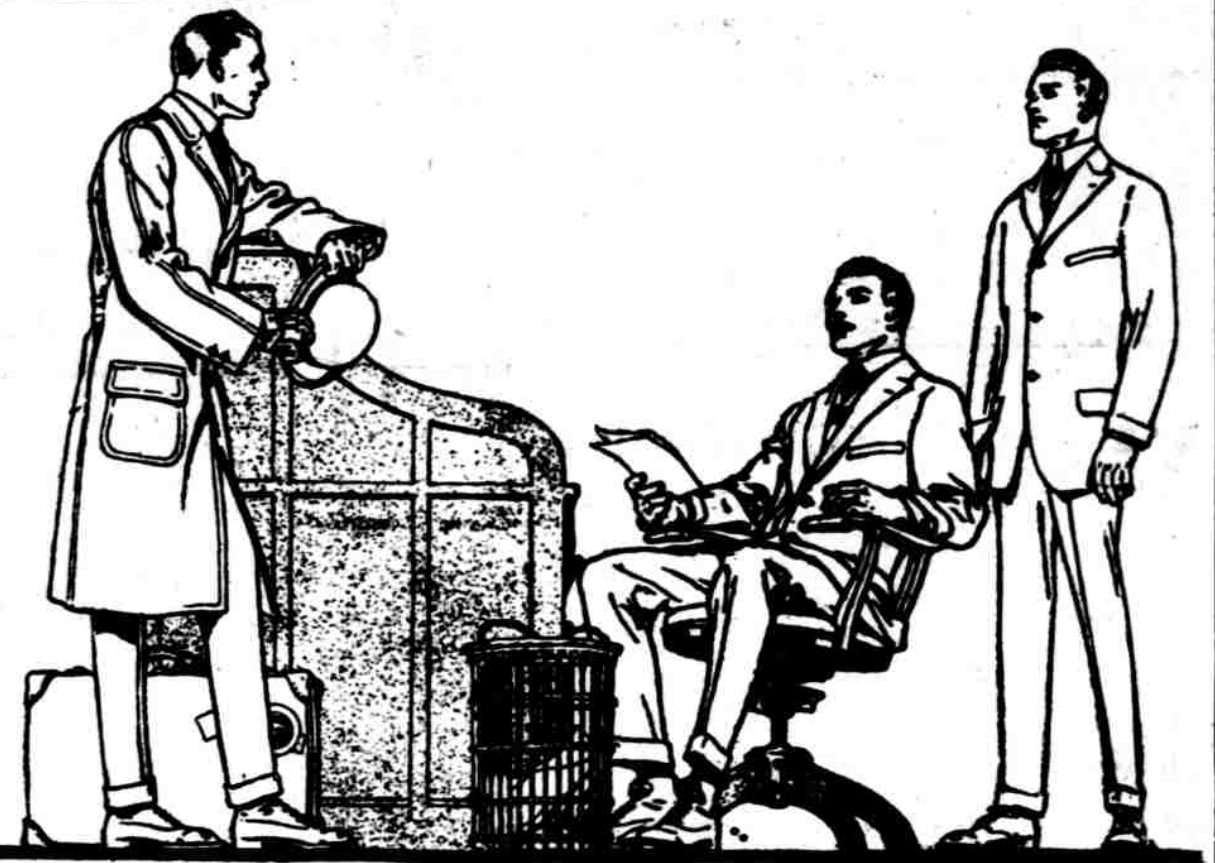

**Wants Special Shape  
For Poison Tablets**

Not only should all poison tablets be made of a distinctive shape, but they should be of a size to contain but one medicinal dose of the drug, so that the taking of one would not necessarily be fatal or particularly harmful, according to Surg. Gen. Rupert Blue, of the Public Health Service.

Surgeon General Blue favors a tablet so distinct that any one past the age of childhood would immediately recognize it. This should apply to the whole category of poisons, he believes.
